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





New York's We'come Home to Victorious Warships

PATRIOTIC SHOW.

The Fleet's Great Ovation-Mayor Van the harbor. Wyck's Welcome-Five Cabinet Officers Represented President McKinley-A Great Marine Procession to Grant's Tomb Where a Salute Was Fired.

KEW YORK CITY (Special) .- Among th most glorious days in the history of New York City and our country was Saturday August 20, four months lacking one day from the time when we entered upon the army or navy or of the armies and navies war with Spain.

That day witnessed the return of Admiral Sampson's victorious fleet from its magnificent history-making experience in Cuban waters and the welcome which New York gave to it as the proxy of the whole country from the Atlantic to the Pacific. The welcome was magnificent. Over a million people lined the shore along where warships passed in review, and crowded the pleasure craft and excursion steamers. which had an uncomfortable list with the weight of patriots mager to do honor to the heroes of the war.

Seven grim black ships, the fighting backbone of the nation's tried navy, passed raview before the eyes of the nation's chief city, steamed up the North River to Grant's Tomb, and there fired a salute to the nation's mighty dead. The event was a triumph and a tribute. At 5.40 o'clock Saturday morning the

ships were sighted from the Highlands and t 6.10 they were visible from the Sandy Hook observatory. They had been running slowly, as Admiral Sampson did not wish to make Sandy Hook before daylight The beach at Sandy Hook and the top of the batteries of Fort Hancock were black with people, who shouted and waved flags in welcome, but no salute was fired until the fleet approached the forts at the entrance to the Narrows.

Then Fort Hamilton fired the opening gun of the salute, Fort Wadsworth quickly fol-Iowa returned the salute.
