

An excellent material for the purpose is the refuse from an old mushroom bed, if such be at command, and if not, leaf-mould answers passed through a half-inch sieve. Spread over the surface of the beds to a depth of about half an inch, it keeps the soil cool and moist and encourages a freer flowering habit in the plants




