> WHEN HE WAS SHOT. It sounded Like the Splash of a Well Backet. "I sounded like the splash of a bucket in a well," observed one of the soldiers in the ar-enal hospital "when the manser bullet winged me in the right ear just outside of Santiago, and the sound has recurred every hour since, and especially at night time. 1 was not looking for anything from the Spaniards, nor was my comrade, who e seived at the same instant a plug in the left shoulder, so was as much surprised for the moment as pained. I can't say that the bullet pained me at all when it entered my ear, though it was very painful soon afterward, and at frequent times since. When I am home I live on a farm, and here became familiar with the sound of s bucket falling down in a well. That was reproduced in my ear. Immediately behind me one of my comrades was whistling one of the popular ballads. As the bucket splash passed away the sound of the whistling came upon my ear. The two have alternated ever since, and the doctor tells me that as the hearing nerves are affected this alternation will continue until my injury has been thoroughly healed up, which he does not expect for some weeks vet. In talking to others who were wounded during the engagement where I was I find that it is a general experience with them that the first information that got inte their brain that they had been wounded was accompanied by a sound or thump, rather than pain. The pain did not, as a rule, come until the injured one had been fully made aware that he had been struck. I met a soldier on the transport which brought us up north who had received an injury in the ear like myself. He has had an advantage over me in that he is constantly hearing a brass band play. A New Zealand inventor has a bievele which is fitted with a row of small pumps around the rim of each wheel, the pistons running on the ground to compress air which is designed to be stored in the frame and used to propel the wheels. Many riders have a habit of lerking out heir knees at the beginning of the stroke when pedalling. This has an ugly appearance, and wastes a considerable amount of the power otherwise available for propu sion. The knees should travel up and down without any lateral motion. The modification of serrated tread tires that combine a perfectly smooth strip in slight longitudinal ribs running on each side to prevent allpping, is a happy one. and likely to prove superior to both the entirely smooth and the entirely rough tires.




