

Another custom has btained, which should not be allowed to degenerate into extravagance, and

that is the sending of gifts at Easter. Among all the quaint ceremonies practice of giving presents of eggs is doubtless the most ancient, as well as the most universal. Eggs have been associated with Easter always. The Jews believed them to be emblematic of the Passover; the Egyptians held them as a emblem of the renewal of the human race after the deluge, and the Christians as the symbol of the






