An Unexplained Mystery.

THE STRANGE DISAPPEARANCE OF AN ENGLISH EXTRAORDINARY.

The secrets of history have a fascination that is all their own to a good many of us. We are always looking for the hidden things of the past. London Queen. Among the mysteries of life may be reckoned the strange story of Mr. Bathurst's disappearance in 1809. Mr. Bathurst's disappearance nearly a century has not cleared up.
