In Spite of His Enforced Mode of Life Captain Hickey Writes That He Never Felt Better in His Life.

"We have just returned to Jaro, after a march of twenty-one days. We left Jaro on the night of November 8 and have been on the road ever since.

In our long march we covered about one hundred and eighteen miles. We were practically shut out from the rest of the world.

In this march we had varied experiences and some that we will long remember. We had to camp where night found us, sometimes on the hillsides and sometimes in churches.

As we returned to Jaro today a worse looking set of men you never looked at. As, as looked at my bearded face and dirty uniform, I would realize one thing, and that was that I had become a rough old soldier.

Well, where is the difference, as long as I never felt better in my life, notwithstanding the fact that I have lived for the past twenty-one days on hard-baked, bacon, and coffee, although the boys would sometimes catch a chicken and share it with us.

As I said, my letter will have just got word that we are to move again to attack another town away up in the northern part of the island.
