### LECTURE ON WILD ANIMALS.

Mr. James W. Cheney requests us to inform the public hereabouts that Mr. Ernest Seton-Thomson will deliver two lectures in Cheney hall on Friday, March 16. One will be given at 4 o'clock in the afternoon and will be entitled "The Personality of Wild Animals," the other will take place at 8 o'clock in the evening on the subject "Wild Animals I Have Known." The afternoon lecture is designed principally for the children.

These lectures are furnished the public free of cost, through the generosity of Cheney Brothers, and are of a very high order. Admission however will be by ticket only. ### REV. A. C. WHITNEY TO LEAVE TOWN.

Rev. A. C. Whitney, pastor of the Adventist church in this place, has accepted a call to the pastorate of the "Household of Faith" at New Haven, a church of the same denomination, and will enter upon his new charge April 1. Mr. Whitney will not move his family until the first of May. The local church will likely not call a pastor at once, but have engaged Eld. A. W. Bradford, of Springfield, Mass., to occupy their pulpit at the Town hall for the month of April. Mr. Whitney will deliver two messages illustrated discourses the next two Sundays, the subjects being on the symbolic seals of the book of Revelation.

### DOUGHERTY LOST.

In the one-mile bed and toe walking match between James F. Dougherty of this place and M. H. Donovan of Glen Falls, N. Y., which took place in Glen Falls last Wednesday evening, Mr. Dougherty lost by half a lap, as he encountered a very rapid opponent, and furthermore he was not in fit condition to enter the match. His trainer, Thomas Hopkinson, is suffering with a severe cold and was not able to go with him. He advised Dougherty not to enter the race, as did his physician.

It is expected that a return match may be arranged between the two men, to take place in the Coliseum, Hartford, in the near future. Had Trainer Hopkinson been along and in charge of his man on the floor, the result would have been different, even as circumstances stood. Donovan's time was a fraction less than seven minutes.
