Yale Students Believe They Have a Great Invention. Francis G. Hale, Jr. and Irving E. Burdick, seniors in the Sheffield Scientific school, have just perfected a new electric rapid-fire gun. Its inventors believe that the weapon is to become an important piece of ordnance, and with it they hope to revolutionize the use of automatic guns to modern naval vessels.

Mr. Hale and Mr. Burdick recently came to public notice by inventing the Yale sub-machine gun, which is now in use by the United States and Russian armies. They have been devoting their spare moments since Christmas to building and perfecting their gun. Some of their experiments were carried on at Light House Point, where they were free from observation, but were heard firing away early in the morning before the occupants of the few cottages thereabouts were stirring.

The gun resembles the Hotchkiss, being mounted on a truck in a similar manner. Its distinguishing feature is a device by which the gun can be fired by electricity from any part of the ship. It is asserted that the device is entirely different from any other for which patents have been granted.

Messrs. Hale and Burdick, though not out of school here, organized the Yale Electric company with an office in this city, to carry on their electrical works. For several years prior to this their work has been done under the name of B. & E. Electric company, but so much more work has been done that they were advised to devote the whole time to it after finishing at Yale.
