Their Flags Now Floating over the Imperial Palace. The STORY OF THE RESCUE.

Rejoice the Relief Column by the Evacuated Foreigners— Allies Enter the Sacred City—Two Companies of the Foreigners Infantry Chased the Wall and Mated the Stars and Stripes.

Pekin, via Chee-Poo (By Cable).—The American and Russian flags were planted on the east wall of Peking at 11 o'clock on the morning of the city was captured. The Indians troops entered the British Legation at 1 and the Americans at 2.

There was a joyful reception from the wall. The evacuated tenants could have lasted but little longer. They had only three days' rations.

The Chinese had been attacking furiously for two days. Four thousand shells fell in the legation during the night. The Japanese sent a message to the north wall, where a part of the Chinese are defending the imperial city. The Japanese casualties have not yet been ascertained.

The plan was to make a general attack the next day, and the troops were arriving at camp. Five miles east, all night they were completely exhausted, and slept in the open fields.

The general, however, alarmed at the prospect of a heavy attack on the legations, pushed forward independently. The British, the American and the Russians and Japanese on the right.

Beginning at 2 o'clock a. m. the Japanese diverted the front of the resistance to the northern city. Their artillery engaged the Chinese heavily.

The Americans and British met with little resistance until they entered the city, where there was street fighting. Betty's battery attempted to breach the inner wall. The troops finally entered the foreign settlement through the gates.

Company E, Fourteenth United States Infantry, planted its flag on the northern wall. The Chinese had continued to violate the armistice.

Wallace proposed to leave no knowledge of her whereabouts, whereat Harrington shot him twice. Harrington then drove a mile to the home of Mrs. William Wallace and again demanded to know where she was. Wallace's answer that she was in the home of Mrs. Harrington, the physician, drove him immediately to Harrington, taking his little girl with him. The Wallace family had no gun case. At Louisville Harrington appeared calm and collected. He purchased more cartridges and a rifle and ammunition. Then he entered another store and bought a revolver, demanding the money.

There were a dozen men in the store, but none made a move to interfere. The clerk turned over the money, and Harrington started to leave the store. As he did so the clerk fired at him. He missed, and Harrington, turning quickly, emptied his revolver into the clerk's chest. None of the shots took effect.
