NELSON FIELDS OF CHARTER OAK STREET ABANDONS HIS FAMILY AND LEAVES THEM IN DESTITUTE CIRCUMSTANCES. WITH ONLY 25 CENTS IN CASH AND A NUMBER OF UNPAID BILLS.
 Took Every Dollar of His Wages With Him Besides a Gold Watch which he has chased For His Wife Recently—He Also Took His Bicycle, After Collecting Over \$19. on His Raffle Tickets.
 Nelson Fields, who up to last Saturday had been employed by the Brookfield Paper Company, attending one of their engine heaters, is a town pariah unknown. A wife and three children are here beseeching the soul plight in which he left them, as he is a wife and did not tell her he was going away. A letter was since found in the pocket of a working coat which he left behind stating that he would never return to her. In this letter he advised Mrs. Fields to put the child-in in the County Home and requested that she be kind to his children. The two oldest children are girls, about 8 and 6 years respectively, and are children of Fields' first wife. Mrs. Fields has an infant child. All are absolutely destitute and are depending on the charity of friends and neighbors. Mrs. Fields is so much distressed by this unfortunate affair that she does not know what course to pursue.
 Fields took his bicycle with him. For some time past he had been selling tickets on the bicycle, with the understanding that he would dispose of it by having a raffle. He is said to have collected about \$19 in this way.

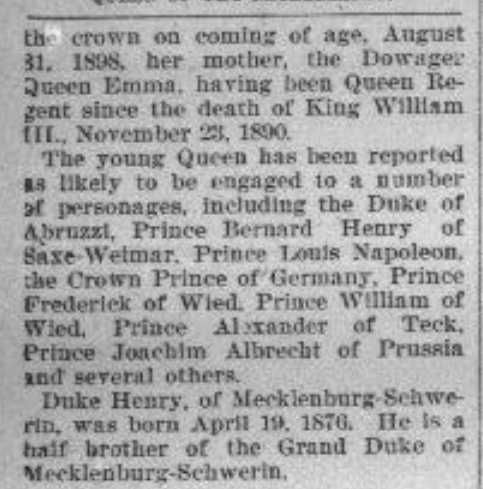
