RICE PLOT CONFESSION

The Millionaire's Valet Accuses Lawyer Patrick of Murder. JONES THEN CUTS HIS THROAT

Senatorial Developments in the Famous Rice Case in New York City. The confession charges that Patrick caused the millionaire's death by the use of an Anesthetic-He Denies the Story.

Nov. York City (Special).—Developments of a sensational character have followed each other in the now famous Rice case. Charles F. Jones, who was the private secretary and valet of William March Rice, the aged millionaire, who died recently under suspicious circumstances, attempted to commit suicide in his cell in the Tombs by stabbing himself with a pen-knife.

The attempt was made just about twenty-four hours after Jones had made a full confession to Assistant District Attorney Osborne, in which he practically accused Albert T. Patrick, who was the New York attorney for the old millionaire, of murdering Mr. Rice by the administration of drugs, and finally of some anesthetic.

It is stated that a personal friend of Jones induced him to make his confession. At least it was this friend, whose name is withheld, who went to the Tombs, where Jones was confined, and invited him to interview the prisoner in the Tombs. Mr. Osborne accepted the invitation, and Jones' confession was heard the presence of witnesses and taken down by a stenographer.

Jones reserved nothing in his confession. He told of the dinner given at the residence of the millionaire, the arrival of the very man who had the knowledge and the nerve to do the deed, and the administration of the anesthetic, which he said he did not know, and the fact that he was the one who administered the anesthetic.

Mr. Patrick asked me for a towel and a sponge, and I got them for him. He then asked me to leave the room. I left the room. He said: 'I will remain with Mr. Rice until he is asleep, and will go out the side door.' Two minutes later I heard Mr. Rice laughing after I left the room, and saw Mr. Rice lying on his back, and the towel was folded in a corner, and was over his whole face, and Mr. Patrick was holding it over his face with his right hand.

Smallpox ravages in India. The attention of the Indian Commission. General Ellwell S. Otis was ordered to command the Department of Lakes. The Treasury accounts for October closed with an excess of receipts over expenditures of \$1,000,000.

Consul-General Holloway, at St. Petersburg, notified the State Department that he was going to Russia. J. P. Morgan & Co. paid the Government \$1,000,000 for the purchase of United States marine rifles at Tien Tsin, China.

Domestic. The John W. Garrett estate in Baltimore, Md., amounting to \$1,500,000 in real estate, was partitioned among the heirs. There was a heavy rainfall all over Texas, and much damage was done by wind and lightning.

Charles E. Eastman, of Harvard, in real estate, was partitioned among the heirs. Charles H. Grogan, Jr., will be placed on trial at Cambridge, Mass., some time between December 1 and 15.

In a wedding celebration at which several hundred guests were present, Greenough, Conn., Harry Mead was twice shot and seriously wounded. The long overland steamer Robert Dollar returned from New York with 850 passengers and \$1,000,000 in gold dust.

RESULTS OF THE ELECTIONS

McKinley Has Over 500,000 More Votes Than Roosevelt. The Republican Congressmen were elected by pluralities ranging from 10,000 in the First to a narrow margin in the Second for Sperry.

Missouri. St. Louis.—The indications are that Bryan has carried the majority of the State, placing the majority in the hands of the Democrats.

Ohio. Columbus, Ohio.—From present indications McKinley has carried the State by 60,000 plurality. Republican State Chairman Dick has given out the following statement: "Returns received up to this hour (11 p. m.) justify the claim that Ohio has given McKinley a plurality of from 75,000 to 100,000."

Illinois. Chicago, Ill.—McKinley has carried the State of Illinois by a tremendous majority. The returns indicate that his plurality will be increased by at least 20,000 over that of 1896. Same vote as in 1896.

Indiana. Indianapolis, Ind.—The State Democratic Committee concedes that Indiana has gone Republican by at least 12,000. Late returns confirm the statement that McKinley will carry Indiana by a greater plurality than he did in 1896-1898.

Pennsylvania. Philadelphia, Penn.—Estimates from one-half of the counties in Pennsylvania indicate a plurality for McKinley of over 200,000. In this city the fusion of the Democrats with the Municipal League cut down the Republican county ticket, but J. Hampton Moore, for Mayor of Philadelphia, is elected by more than 50,000 plurality.

Delaware. Wilmington, Del.—Late returns indicate that McKinley will have a narrow victory in Delaware. His majority in Newcastle County is more than 2000. The State of Delaware has elected Congress tickets in its three counties.

North Dakota. Grand Forks, N. D.—Chairman Kleingrover, of the Democratic State Committee, concedes the election of the McKinley ticket in North Dakota. The State is claimed by the Republicans for both National and State and Legislative tickets by a plurality of from 8000 to 12,000.

COMBINATION LAMP-POST

A lamp-post has been introduced in England which combines a fire hydrant, tap and fire alarm box. The hydrant can be used for fire purposes by sliding watercarts and for street lighting, while the small tap can be used by an individual for domestic water supply.

Wisconsin. Milwaukee, Wis.—Returns from most of the precincts in Wisconsin, including a few precincts in Milwaukee, indicate that President McKinley's plurality of 102,612 in 1896 will be more than equaled.

South Dakota. Sioux Falls, S. D.—Reports from all parts of the State indicate that South Dakota gives McKinley a plurality of between 3000 and 4000.

Washington. Seattle, Wash.—The Republicans claim the State, placing the majority in the hands of the Democrats. The Puget Sound counties were considered sure for McKinley.

Rhode Island. Providence, R. I.—McKinley's probable majority in Rhode Island is 18,000. In 1896 it was 22,978. McKinley's vote in Providence and the districts at large is about twice that polled by Bryan. McKinley's plurality in the city will reach 4100.

Idaho. Boise, Idaho.—The count of the vote is going very slowly, but the returns indicate that Bryan has carried the State.

West Virginia. Parkersburg, W. Va.—Chairman Davenport of the Republican State Committee concedes that McKinley has given McKinley 17,000 plurality.

Iowa. Des Moines, Iowa.—Indications point to a late hour to the carrying of Iowa by McKinley by an increased majority of 20,000 over 1900. The State Republican ticket is also elected, including all Congress tickets in its three counties.
