at the posceror-cand oct-self-duction of living smakes which I kept in glassfronted tages for the purpose of studying their habits, temperaments and intelligence. They were all caught by my own hands. Out in the country, on the volid and in the bush, I had watched them as much as possible in their native state, and now supplemented this study by keeping them afterward under my eyes at home. This work I had carried on since September, 1875, so that I had acquired a pretty extensive knowledge of the snakes of southern Africs.
