CAPTURING A BOOMSLANG.

At Grahamstown, South Africa, in 1876, I had a large collection of living snakes which I kept in glass-fronted cages for the purpose of studying their habits, temperaments and intelligence. BUDGET OF STATE NEWS.

The State's Fishing Industry. The Fisheries and Game Commission has just published its report. It gives details of the most abundant fisheries maintained by the State at Windsor Locks and at Joshua Hook. The total value of the catch is valued at \$115,000 for the year 1900, which is the largest for ten years and justifies the wisdom of the State's policy in the matter.

Proposed Reorganization of State Tax. A subject which is to be brought before the Legislature by action of various boards of trade is the proposed reorganization of the State tax. At the annual meeting of the Board of Trade in Hartford Secretary Woodbridge proposed that the present game law be amended so that the State should be maintained at State expense a game preserve in all times under the State's supervision.

The official figures as forwarded to Washington gave the population as 4,650,000. It was found, however, that the census takers had made a mistake in counting the population of the State.

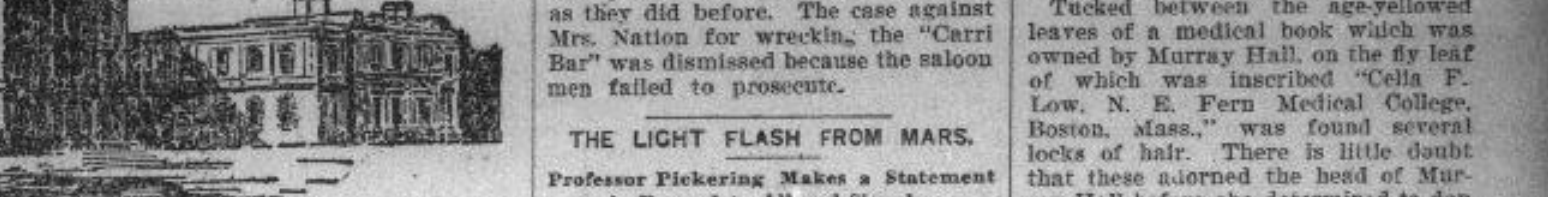
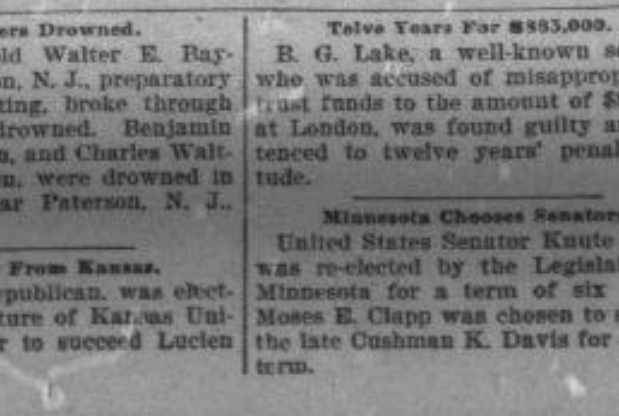
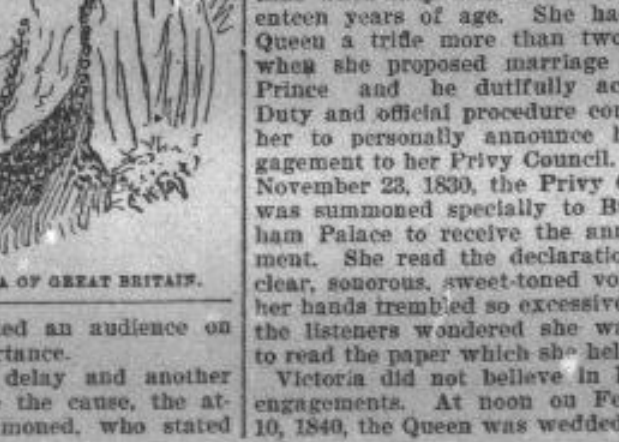
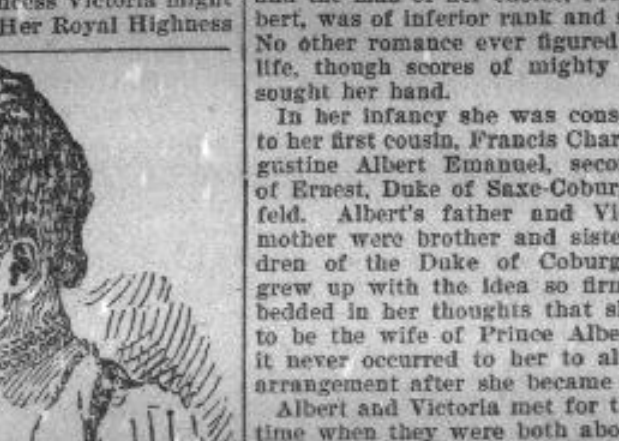
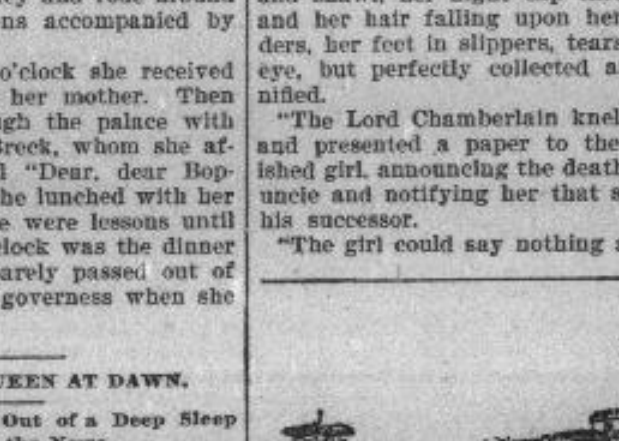
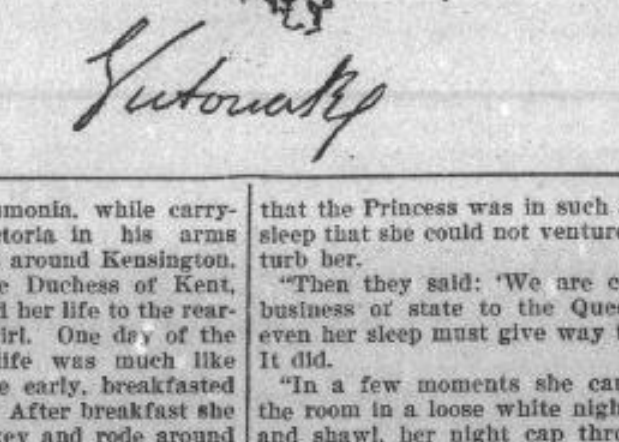
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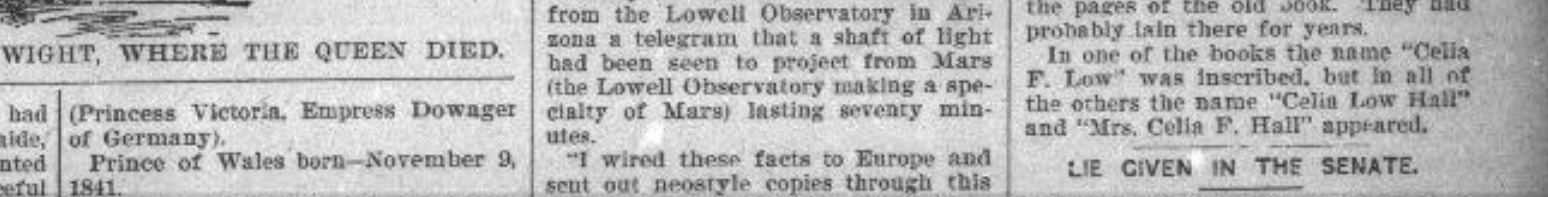
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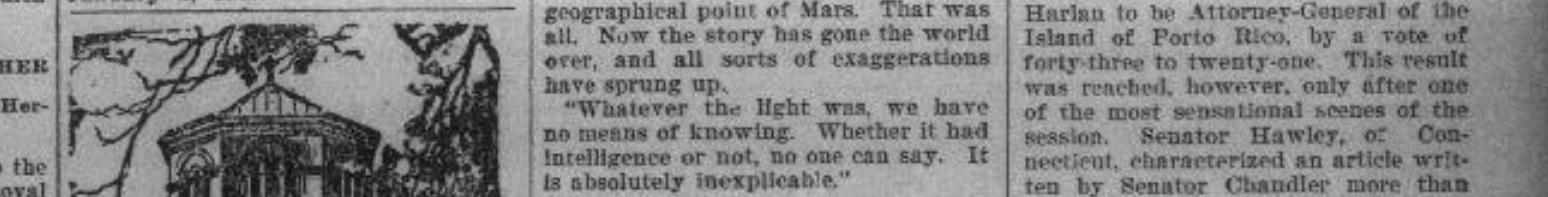
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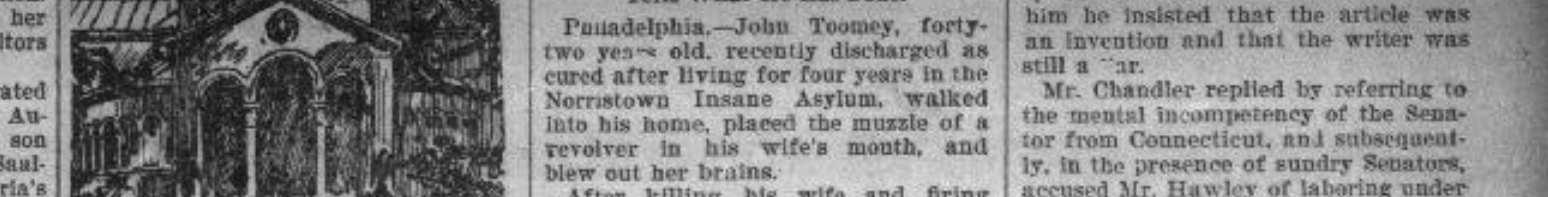
OSBORNE HOUSE, ISLE OF WIGHT, WHERE THE QUEEN DIED.



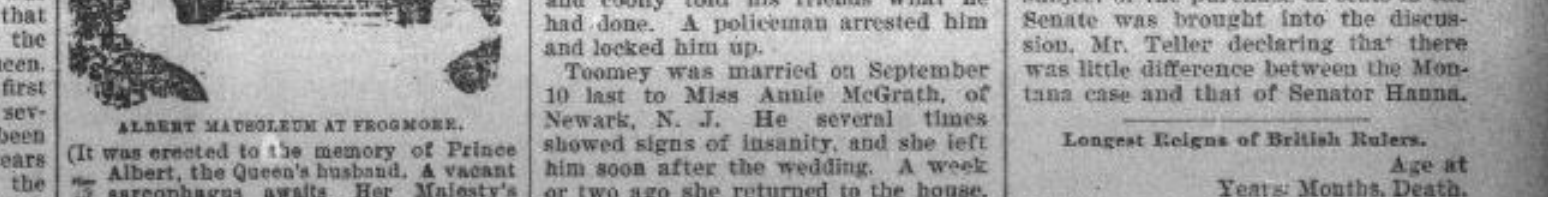
ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY, WHO HAD THE QUEEN'S BODILY REMAINS BURIED AT WINDSOR.



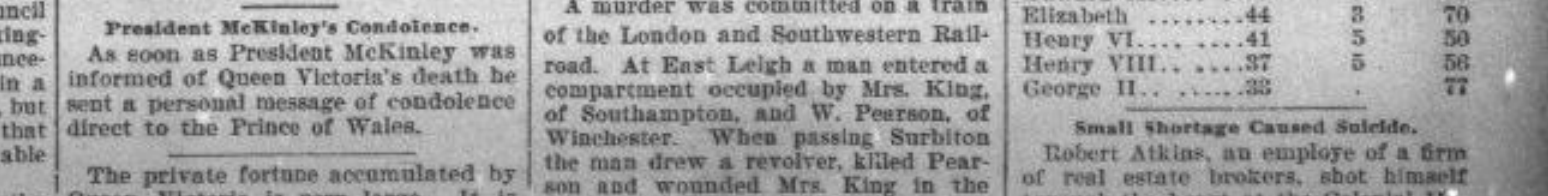
QUEEN VICTORIA IN A CARRIAGE, ON THE DAY SHE WAS CROWNED.



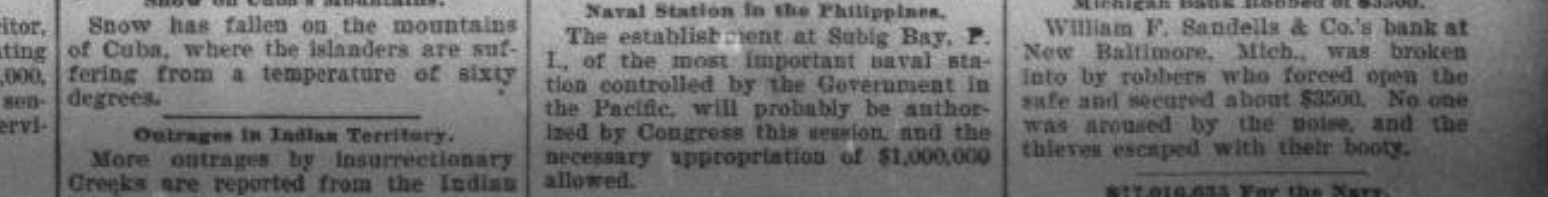
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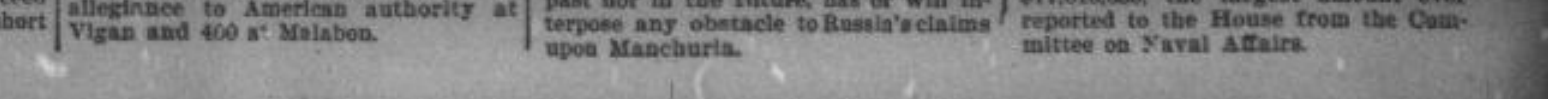

**MURDER: SECOND DEGREE**

**Jury Declares the Guilt of Jennie Borschleter's Slaying**

**THIRTY YEARS IS THE PENALTY**  
**Dramatic End of the Famous Murder Trial at Paterson, N. J. - Five Days' Hearing - Jury Decides on Second Degree Murder For Acquittal - Convicted Man Shows Belief at the Result.**

Paterson, N. J. - Murder in the second degree was the verdict found by the jury against Walter G. McAllister, William A. Death and Andrew J. Campbell, the three young men who on the night of October 18 dragged and assaulted the seventeen-year-old girl, Jennie Borschleter, with the result that she died in the carriage in which they brought her back to Paterson from the lonely place, four miles out on the Rock road, where the crime was committed. The extreme penalty which may be imposed is imprisonment at hard labor for thirty years.
