After the carpet is thoroughly cleaned and renovated roll and wrap in a tight cover. When It is to be put down again brush the edges of the floor with turpentine or coal oil, being sure to get in all the cracks. Sprinkle salt plentifully over the face of the carpet next to the washboards and on any edges that are to be turned under. From experience it has been found that salt effectually prevents the carpet from being caten by moths, buffalo bugs or any such varmints. 
