On October 27 the Frenchman tried to kill the captain with the axe, but another man wrested the weapon from him and killed him. When night fell the others ate part of the Frenk-man's body. On October 28 Captain Crocker died and his body was eaten. The cannibalism was repeated until the two men who tell the story, Jo hannsen, a Swede, and Marticornu, a Spaniard, were the only survivors. Finally the raft drifted ashore on Soubi Island. The natives there were friendly and put the two men on






