MARRIED IN NORWICH.

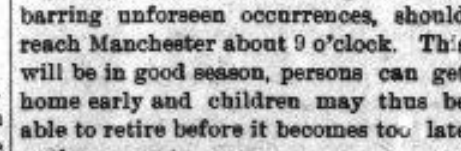
Sylvester W. Siskner of Manchester and Mrs. Harriet E. Pratt of Norwich were married in Norwich last Wednesday.

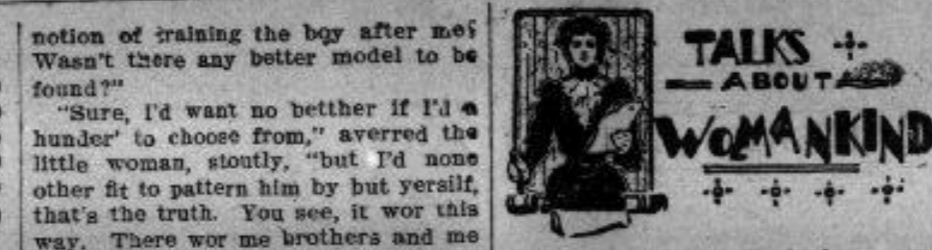

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SAN FRANCISCO TIED UP

Strike of the City Front Federation Paralyzes Shore Traffic.

ALL STATE'S INDUSTRIES SUFFER

Total of 25,000 Men in Different Trades Idle—15,000 Work Only—Paralysis of City's Labor Troubles—Paralysis of Wholesale Business—California's Greatest Strike.

San Francisco, Cal.—The labor trouble in this city, which has been brewing for some time, reached a crisis and as a result maritime traffic and labor along shore are nearly at a standstill and industries are almost totally paralyzed.

The order for a general walkout of the City Front Federation, which comprises fourteen unions and organizations, was made effective. Twelve thousand men obeyed the order the first day.

The City Front Federation is composed of the following organizations: Sailors' Union of the Pacific, four local unions of longshoremen, marine firemen, Brotherhood of Teamsters, stevedores, warehousemen, ship clerks, plumbers and bridge builders, hostlers, electricians, and coal trimmers.

It is claimed by the officers of the organization that the strike is not purely an expression of sympathy with the Union of Marine and Shipworkers, but is a protest against the actions of the employers' association.

The strike is determined to defend the principle of unionism, which the associated employers have announced their intention to crush.

From a desire to determine to carry the fight on, and all efforts on the part of the Mayor and others to secure a settlement have thus far proved unavailing.

The officers of the labor union, said: "This is the greatest strike in the history of the State. Its effects will be far-reaching; the city and State will suffer a loss of \$100,000,000 a day. We will not give up until we have secured our demands. We have no other alternative. We are determined to defend the principle of unionism, which the associated employers have announced their intention to crush."

FOSBURG IS ACQUITTED

Court Directs Jury to Return a Verdict of "Not Guilty."

After a Trial of Several Days, the Jury Reached a Decision in Favor of the Defendant.

Pittsfield, Mass.—The trial of Robert Stewart Fosburg for the alleged killing of his sister, May, in August, 1906, was abruptly closed when the jury, under instructions from the court, returned a verdict of not guilty. The jury did not leave their seats until they had reached a decision in favor of the defendant.

FREE TRADE IS GRANTED

Duties Between Porto Rico and the United States Abolished.

President Announces That the Islanders Have Adopted an Adequate System of Taxation.

Washington, D. C.—President McKinley has issued his proclamation establishing free trade between Porto Rico and the United States, and declaring the organization of a civil government for the island. The proclamation is purely formal, and is headed: "Constitution of Porto Rico, 1900." It recites that the act of April 12, 1900, otherwise known as the Foraker act, provided that whenever the Porto Rican Legislature has enacted and put into operation a system of local taxation, and by resolution so notified the President, the latter shall issue a proclamation, and all duties on goods passing between the United States and Porto Rico shall cease. As the Legislature has complied with that requirement, the act is now in force. The resolutions, which are quoted in full in the body of the proclamation, that is several minutes in length, are as follows:

"Whereas, I, William McKinley, President of the United States, in pursuance of the provisions of law above quoted, and upon the foregoing recitals, do hereby certify that the Porto Rican Legislature has enacted and put into operation a system of local taxation, and by resolution so notified the President, the latter shall issue a proclamation, and all duties on goods passing between the United States and Porto Rico shall cease. As the Legislature has complied with that requirement, the act is now in force. The resolutions, which are quoted in full in the body of the proclamation, that is several minutes in length, are as follows:
