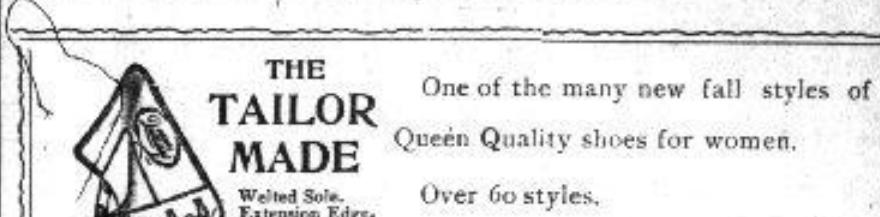

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# DEATH OF THE PRESIDENT

## He Succumbed to the Assassin's Bullet in the Milburn House at Buffalo at 2.15 O'clock Saturday Morning.

### "It is God's Way, His Will Be Done," His Dying Words to His Sorrowing Wife.

## HOMAGE OF GRIEF AT MCKINLEY'S BIER

Buffalo, N. Y.—The tragedy of the new century culminated at 2:15 o'clock on Saturday morning when President McKinley peacefully passed away at the residence of John G. Milburn. Mrs. McKinley had retired to her room, and was not with him at the end. His last conscious words related to writing Dr. Mann, who stood at his bedside when they were uttered, were as follows:

"Good bye. All good bye. It is God's way. His will be done, not ours."  
The present at the time of the President's death were Secretary Cortelyou, Dr. Hixey, Mrs. and Miss Barber and Miss Ince.

President McKinley's last conscious hour on earth was spent with his wife in the Milburn house. He died unattended by a minister of the gospel, but his last words were a humble submission to the will of the God in Whom he believed. He was surrounded to the end by the same spirit of calmness and peace which had marked his long and honorable career.

Mrs. McKinley lost her husband between 11 and 12 o'clock. At that time she sat by the bedside, holding his hand. The members of the cabinet were admitted to the sick room singly at that time.

President McKinley's relatives and the members of his official family who were at the Milburn house, except Secretary Wilson, who did not avail himself of the opportunity, and some of the members of the cabinet, were present at the time of the President's death.

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# ROOSEVELT TAKES OATH

## Sworn in at Buffalo as Twenty-sixth President of the United States.

### HE ANNOUNCES HIS POLICY

## Requests the Cabinet of His Dead Predecessor to Continue in Office—No Extra Session of Congress.

Buffalo, N. Y.—Theodore Roosevelt became the twenty-sixth President of the United States just thirteen hours and ten minutes after the death of William McKinley. He took the oath of office in the small library in the old Colonial residence of Anselmy Wilcox at 3.35 p. m. on Saturday.
