Secretors I. Every person liable to give in a list of his taxable property, and having failed to do so, may, within twenty days after the expiration of the time fixed by law for filing such list, be notified in writing by the assessors or a majority of them, to appear before them to be examined under oath as to his property liable to taxation, and for the purpose of verifying a list made out by them under the provisions of acction 380 of the general statutes as amended by Chapter CIF of the public acts of 187. Any person who shall wilfully neglect or refuse to appear before said assessors and make oath to a list of his taxable property within ten days after having been so notified, or who having appeared shall refuse to answer, shall be fined not more than one thousand dollars.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the assessors promptly to notify the proper prosecuting.






