ANOTHER DISASTROUS FIRE

WITHIN AN HOUR LAST MONDAY MORNING THE SPLENDID NEW BRICK CRACKER FACTORY AND BAKERY OF FRANK GOETZ ON MAIN STREET WAS IN RUINS.

A fierce blast aided the work of the flames and hastened the destruction of the factory. Fire broke through the main roof of the factory, and the flames fell in a shower of burning shingles.

The Goetz cracker factory, a large brick building, was destroyed by a fire which broke out on Monday morning, causing a loss of about \$75,000.

There was great danger to surrounding property, as the wind was blowing from the north and the fire was spreading rapidly.

Mr. Goetz was negotiating for the purchase of several adjoining lands, in order to further increase the output of his factory.

The walls were kept by the heat, and all those who were saved. This relieves the work of continuing the business and adjusting the insurance.

An improvised office has been established in Mr. Goetz's residence, and bookkeepers and typewriters are engaged on the voluminous work necessary in carrying on the business.

It is believed that the fire was caused by a short circuit in the wiring of the main factory.

The present outlook is that another, and perhaps larger and better building will be erected on the present site, as soon as the insurance can be adjusted, and necessary arrangements made.

The plumbers and steam fitters had just completed a fire extinguishing system in the factory last Saturday, and this would have been in operation had the fire not broken out.

When the alarm was heard many who were preparing to go to work in the mill hurried to the scene.

The excitement which prevailed at the fire all the furniture was removed from the residence of Mr. Goetz, and between the rough and hurried handling out and in, and the heavy snow which prevailed, the goods were damaged to a considerable extent.

With characteristic energy Mr. Goetz placed the fire on the road and the fire serving his patrons. The smiling countenance of John J. McCarthy, Mr. Goetz's good natured, faithful and energetic body man, was welcomed at the scene.

Mr. Goetz was almost prostrated by the fire, and is under Doctor Bradley's care. It is hoped that he will soon rally and be able to resume his place by his business.

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LAUNDRY LINES.

When washing satens or other cottons with a satin finish, rinse in borax water to give a gloss.

NEW FIRE ALARM WHISTLE.

As there has been more or less confusion here in the matter of understanding the fire alarm whistle, Cheney Brothers have bought a new one, which will be used alternately with the old, in giving an alarm.

The plan is, to have the new whistle sound the note, and the old one the note, whatever the call may be. For example, Take No. 23, which was the alarm given last Saturday evening.

The new whistle is not quite as large as the old one, and consists of a single whistle. The old one is made up of a chime of whistles, of slightly different tones, and the blending of these gives a sound different from that of any whistle in town.

These whistles are put in by Cheney Brothers, free of charge to the Fire District, and are operated by Cheney Brothers in like manner. We learn that they are expensive appliances, and cost not far from \$100 each, counting expense of installing, etc.

It will be seen therefore that they are very anxious to do all they can to aid the work of the Fire Department, and to save the Fire District expense in this important particular, as well as in many others.

SCHOOL MEETING.

LARGE ATTENDANCE AT SPECIAL MEETING OF THE NINTH SCHOOL DISTRICT LAST NIGHT.

Proprietors of Cheney Brothers to Erect a New School House on the West Side of Main Street, Directly Opposite Present Group of School Buildings, Promptly Accepted—Vote of Thanks Tended by Cheney Brothers For This Generous Offer and For Their Liberty to the Ninth School District, in the Past.

More than 150 persons assembled at the Ninth District school last evening, in answer to the call for a special meeting, as noticed in these columns last week.

The meeting was called to order by John S. Cheney, chairman of the Ninth District School committee, and on motion of John M. Shewey, Mr. Cheney was chosen as presiding officer of the meeting. The chair announced that in accordance with the usual custom, the clerk of the district, C. S. Cheney, would act as clerk of the meeting.

Mr. Cheney had his stenographer, Miss Marcella Conklin, at his side, for the purpose of securing a stenographic report of the meeting.

The first business in order was the reading of the report of the committee of the Ninth School District, which was read by the clerk. It is as follows: REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE OF THE NINTH SCHOOL DISTRICT OF MANCHESTER.

The last addition to this school building was first occupied by children in January 1898. The enumeration taken in the previous October showed that there were 988 children of school age in the district. The enumeration of October 1901 shows that there are now 1448 children of school age, a gain of 460 in a year, a gain of 480 in nine years, a gain of 48 per cent in nine years. If the rate of growth remains the same for the next nine years, there will be fully 2300 children in the district.

This school building will accommodate about 1100 children of primary grade, and the present building, at Cooper Hill will accommodate about 300 more than the present building. We also face a probable increase of from 75 to 100 new pupils this spring.

Steps must be taken at once to provide temporary quarters for about 100 pupils and action should be taken at once to provide permanent quarters for 300 pupils. In view of the rapid growth of the number of school children during the last nine years, it would seem ill advised and poor economy to build a building with a seating capacity for less than 750 children.

We recommend that the proposition of Cheney Brothers to build a new school house on their lot on Main street, directly opposite the present school house be accepted by the district, as such terms as may be agreed on between the School Committee and Cheney Brothers.

Manuscript, Feb. 20th, 1902. The chair then stated that it would perhaps be well to let the people know what proposition Cheney Brothers had to offer in order that in intelligent action may be had thereon. He forthwith proceeded to read the same. It is as follows:

CHESEY BROTHERS PROPOSITION. At a meeting of the directors of Cheney Brothers held February 14, 1902, it was resolved:

"To submit to the Ninth School District of Manchester, a proposition on behalf of Cheney Brothers to build a new school house, to afford the additional room required for the proper accommodation of the increased number of children, for which the old school house is inadequate, and to submit plans for the approval of the School Committee of the Ninth District of Manchester, or approval by the district, with full details regarding same."

The chair explained that Cheney Brothers would give the lot now occupied by the Sullivan block, directly across Main street, for the purpose of the proposed new building, and that the plans for the building were not yet ready.

He then inquired what action the meeting proposed to take. M. B. Chapman thereupon favored the adoption of Cheney Brothers' proposition, in order to bring the question before the meeting in proper form.

E. O. Cheney inquired if a preliminary vote was not necessary in order to permit this question to take precedence.
