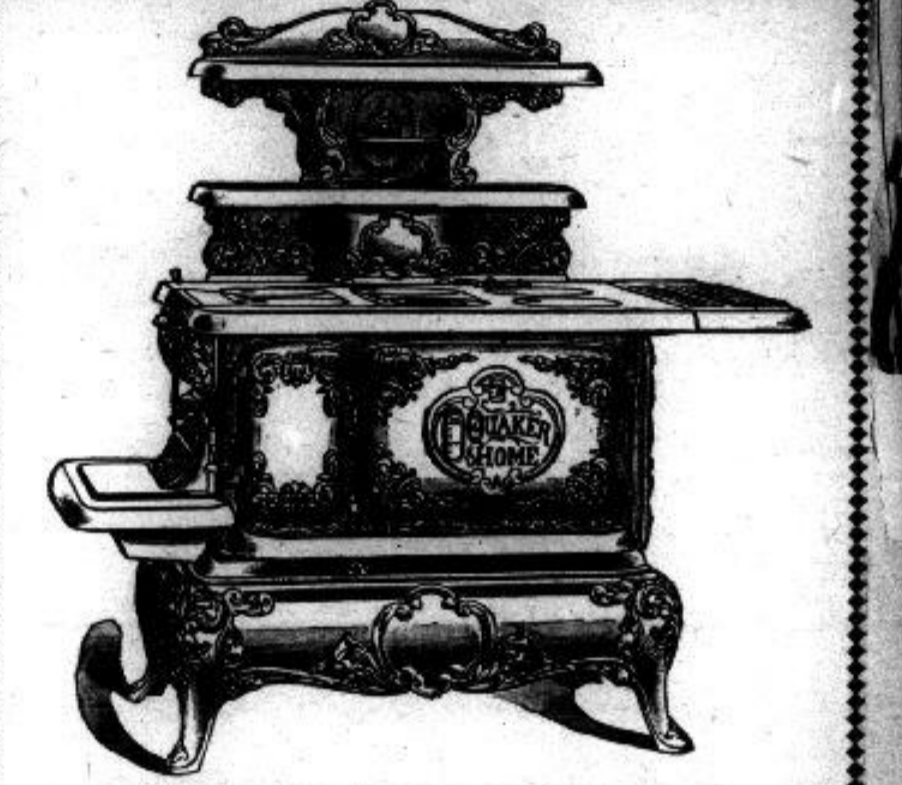

THE STRIKE SITUATION.

NO LIKELIHOOD OF SETTLEMENT AT THIS WRITING—BOTH SIDES APPEAR TO BE HOLDING FIRMLY TO THE RESPECTIVE STAND TAKEN. Third Week of the Strike Now Well Advanced—The Town Becoming Unionized as Rapidly as the Necessary Arrangements for Same Can be Made—Nearly all Laboring Men and Women in Town Are Strongly in Sympathy With the Striking Velvet Weavers—The Days of Non-Unionism for South Manchester Have Apparently Passed.

The strike of the velvet weavers employed by Cheney Brothers, which started on Tuesday, March 25th, has now reached its third week. The cause of the refusal of the weavers to allow one man to operate two 8-shuttle looms on a 30-take-up velvet, at 19 cents a yard, is still in progress, and although the third week of the strike is now well advanced, there seems to be no likelihood of a settlement in sight. Both sides seem to stand firmly by the positions they have taken.

The strikers on their part will gladly return to their looms, provided that the attempt to have one man operate two 8-shuttle looms on a 30-take-up velvet at 19 cents a yard, and 12 cents a yard afterwards. This proposition was submitted to the weavers by Cheney Brothers and was brought before their meeting this week, with the result that it was rejected.

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STRIKERS WILL DANCE.

FIRST TIME IN HISTORY OF TOWN THAT STRIKERS AS SUCH HAVE COME BEFORE PUBLIC IN THIS ROLE. Unprecedented Sale of Tickets and Unquestionable Success of Event—Music Will Be Furnished by a Union Orchestra Free—Tickets, Posters and Prompting Free Also.

The striking velvet weavers here will give the first dance ever presented by strikers as such in the history of this town and it promises to eclipse anything in the amusement line in point of number of tickets sold that has ever been known here.

The dance will occur in the Armory opera house on Tuesday evening of next week, April 15th. Music will be furnished by a large union orchestra of local musicians under the direction of Professor McGuire, of McGuire & Lennon's orchestra. The music will be given free to the strikers, and will be the most popular and pleasing order. The musicians will endeavor to furnish music that will satisfy the large audience which will surely be in attendance. A union promoter will call off the dances. His services are to be placed at the disposal of the strikers free of charge. Tickets and posters have been furnished free of charge also. The only charge therefore that the strikers will have to meet, is so far as they know, will be that of the ball. Practically all the money that will go to the assistance of those who are in need of aid.

The sale of tickets has been unprecedented here. Fifteen hundred tickets were furnished in the first instance and disposed of in one day. Two thousand more had to be procured for the disposal of the strikers free of charge. Tickets are purchasing them on every hand. Many have paid for them and destroyed them, as they did not intend to see them either for themselves or to give them to others. In this way they assist the strikers doubly, by not supplying admission cards free of charge to any one. That they have the sympathy of the community is beyond question.
