THE STRIKERS BALL.

UNUSUALLY LARGE GATHERING ASSEMBLED IN THE ARMORY OPERA HOUSE LAST TUESDAY EVENING TO ATTEND THE FIRST CONCERT AND BALL GIVEN BY THE STRIKING VELVET WEAVERS.

Members of the Carpenters, Plumbers and Plasterers Unions, marched in to the Hall and wore their respective badges in the Grand March and White at the Dance.—The Best of Order Prevailed All the Evening.

The first concert and ball given by the striking velvet weavers here took place in the Armory opera house last Tuesday evening, and proved an overwhelming success in point of singers and soloists.

A large orchestra composed of soloists from the several orchestras in the city, and a large number of vocalists, constituted their services and furnished good music, considering the fact that they did not have any opportunity for rehearsal.

Persons standing up occupied space from the door, all across the hall, reaching up about one third of the distance to the stage.

The floor was crowded but all were good natured, orderly and agreeable. Not a single incident occurred to mar the enjoyment of anyone.

The strikers were very much elated at the fine success which crowned their first attempt in the domain of public entertainment.

THE STRIKE SITUATION.

Another Effort Made Yesterday to Bring About a Settlement, But It Was Not Successful.—Deadlock Still Holds Firmly.—Nearly End of Fourth Week of Velvet Weavers Strike.—About One Half of Velvet Weavers Have Left Town.

In so far as is known to us at this writing, there is nothing new in the velvet weavers' strike, in as far as effecting a settlement is concerned. It is now the fourth week of the strike, and we do not see any signs of its termination.

An effort was made yesterday to bring about a settlement, through the mediation of Rev. J. A. Biddle, but this did not succeed.

Mr. Biddle presented this proposition to Cheney Brothers, but they did not accept it. They stand by their position of last week, as published in the columns.

The strikers report a considerable inflow of funds from outside, as well as inside sources, and are endeavoring, through their finance committee, to expend the same judiciously.

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WOMEN IN BUSINESS.

Some Reasons in Answer to the Question, "Why do women call in business?" the secretary of a woman's employment bureau in London recently said: "Not long ago I set myself to solve that problem. I had before me the particulars of some 200 girls and women for whom a certain society had been unable to find work."

"I think some women fall in business for these reasons—want of training, which is another name for lack of education, and deficient education. If sufficient experience prevents a girl from being accepted as a clerk or a nursery governess, how much more likely is it to prevent a woman from holding her own when she attempts, in the face of commercial competition, to establish any kind of business for herself?"

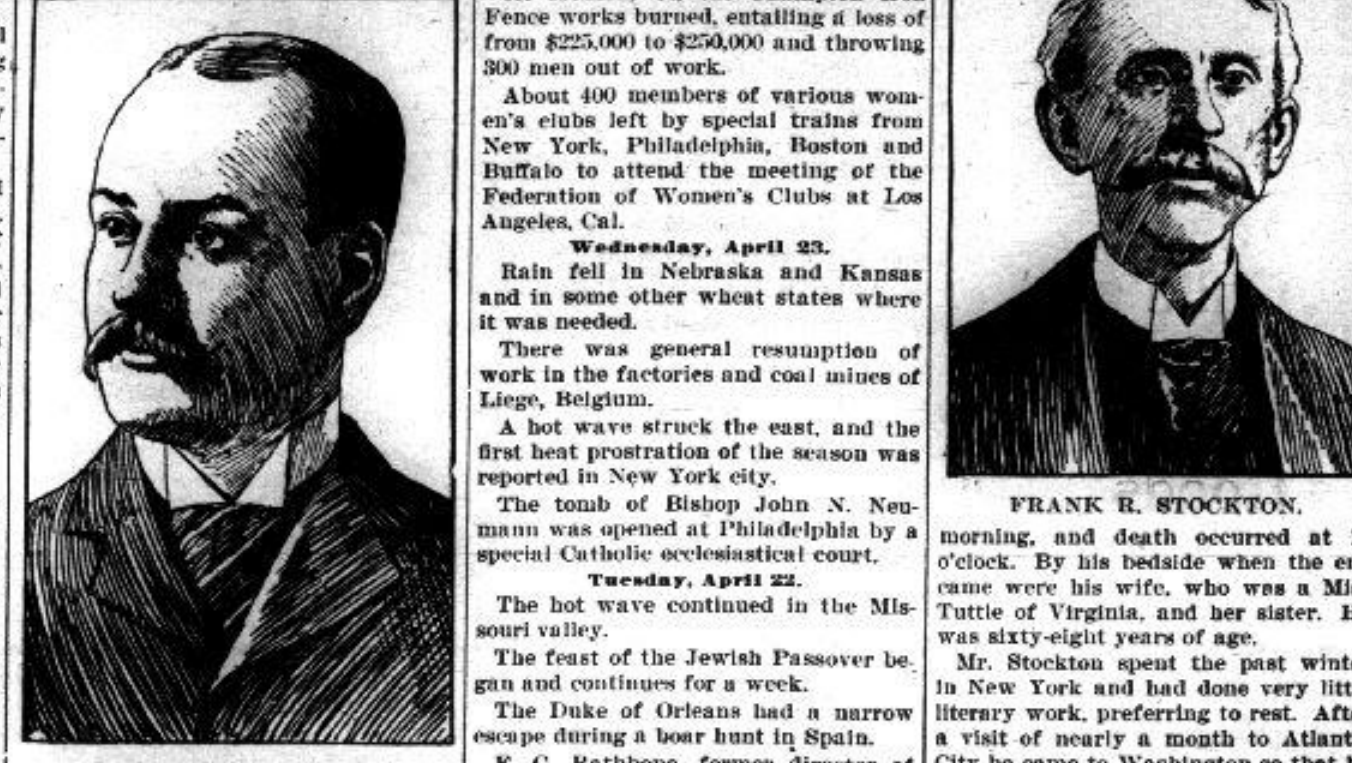
