INTERESTING FIGURES.

OFFICIAL REPORT OF CONNECTICUT BIBLE SOCIETY ON RELIGIOUS STATUS OF THIS TOWN.

The Connecticut Bible Society has just completed its religious canvass of the town of Manchester, made under the auspices of most of the Protestant churches of the place.

Their men found 2,444 families in the town, including 11,228 persons, excluding boarders and inmates of institutions. The average to a family is 4.63.

Of these 2,444 families, 8 are Advent, 19 Baptist, 506 Congregational, 481 Episcopal, 4 Jew, 325 Lutheran, 428 Methodist, 1 Presbyterian, 607 Roman Catholic, 3 Unitarian, 29 Unitarian Army, 60 no preference, with a few others which include "The Brethren", Pentecostal church, and Christian Scientist.

1,721 families and 8,100 persons were found in the town, and 728 families and 3,079 persons in North Manchester. 2,847 members of Protestant churches were recorded, the Episcopal church having the largest number, the Lutheran following closely, and then the Congregational, Methodist, Salvation Army, Baptist, Advent and Presbyterian in order of numbers.

Regarding nationalities, 16 foreign races are represented, including 35 Danish families, 47 English, 23 Canadian, French, 41 French, 220 German, 27 Irish, 5 Italian, 14 Polish, 4 Russian, 20 Scotch, 157 Swedish, 3 Swiss, 2 New Foundland, 1 Lithuanian, 1 Spanish, and 1 Chinese.

SCRANTON, Pa., Dec. 4.—The anthracite coal companies and their employees having failed to come to an agreement during the Thanksgiving recess of the strike commission, the hearing of the miners' side of the case has been resumed.
