





And in order to make its assurance. doubly acceptable Russia climbed down on the Kamtchatka fishery dispute and voluntarily continued, in polite deference to Japanese representations, to grant fishery licenses to Japunese subjects fishing along that coast for another year; and this policy, it is intimated, will be continued indefinitely, not only in regard to the Kamtchatka fisheries, but to those of Saghalien also.
