BASE BALL.

Meeting of Stockholders To Be Held Next Monday Evening at Orford Hall.

The incorporators of the Manchester Base Ball Association, H. O. Bowers, F. T. Elish and O. F. Toop, have issued a call for the meeting of the stockholders of the association to be held at Orford hall next Monday evening at 8 o'clock. A Board of Directors will be chosen by the stockholders. In all probability the Board of Directors will also hold a meeting directly after the meeting of the stockholders, organize themselves, and elect officers of the base ball association for the ensuing year. Over 70 of the 80 shares of stock have been taken already, and subscriptions are still coming in. The limit is 80 stockholders at \$5 each, and that will soon be reached. The capital stock is \$2,000.

She is survived by her husband, five children, four girls and a boy, three sisters, Mrs. John McMenamy, Miss Christine Hollister and Miss Nellie Hollister, all of Manchester, and her father, Orrin Hollister.

The funeral will be held at her home in Wapping Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. John Harriet, pastor of the Wapping Congregational church, assisted by Rev. Clarence H. Barber, pastor of the North Congregational church, officiating. The burial will be in the Wapping cemetery.

STOCKHOLDERS MEET.

Persons Interested in Formation of Bank Here Assemble at Orford Hall.

A meeting of stockholders of the proposed bank for this place was held at the Orford hall last Wednesday evening, and the following persons were present: O. M. Nilson, J. W. Hale, C. E. House, F. T. Elish, W. E. Hibbard, Dr. W. R. Tinker, Dr. T. H. Walden, E. L. G. Hohenthal, Rev. W. J. McGurk, Rev. F. J. Murphy, George W. Finlay, James E. O'Brien, E. T. Ferris, George W. Ferris, J. B. Hubbard, John P. Craig, John Digney, George M. Barber, William Behnfield, Charles Behnfield, J. M. Burke, A. W. Hollister, George W. Smith, Theodore H. Bidwell, Frank M. Wolcott, Arthur Manning, H. O. Bowers, O. F. Toop, George Ferris, Jr. and representatives of the press.

The meeting was called to order by O. M. Nilson and Dr. Tinker was chosen as presiding officer. E. L. Hohenthal recorded the minutes.

Mr. Nilson stated that more than \$40,000 of the required \$50,000 had been subscribed, that several persons who were expected to take shares could not be seen, owing to absence from town, but that practically sufficient subscriptions were in sight to fill out the list.

A general discussion of the duties of the bank officials required was held, and Mr. Nilson answered such questions regarding same as were asked.

Mr. Nilson suggested the advisability of having an experienced Hartford banker as one of the directors, or at least one of the persons who would be authorized to look over the books and accounts of the bank from time to time, as might be required, and also to act in an advisory capacity when needed. He held that this would strengthen confidence in the proposed bank. The question was discussed but no action taken.

On motion of Mr. Nilson a committee was appointed to receive bids for sites, both temporary and permanent, for the proposed bank, also propositions for safe, vaults, and for stationery. The following were chosen by the meeting for this purpose: F. T. Elish, C. E. House, W. E. Hibbard, J. W. Hale and E. L. G. Hohenthal. The matter of holding the next meeting of the stockholders was left subject to the call of the committee. No further business appearing the meeting dissolved.

TRIBUTE TO THE LATE FRANK CHENEY.
The following tribute to the late Frank Cheney of this place, appeared in this morning's Hartford Courant.

I wish to offer my tribute to the late Mr. Frank Cheney, whose loss can not be more sincerely felt outside of his immediate relatives than by myself. It was my good fortune to be associated with him in the beginning of my career as a mechanic.

My first patented invention, made under his supervision, was an automatic silk spooling machine, which was adapted by the Cheney Brothers. My spare time while in their employ was devoted to the invention of the repeating rifle which figured so prominently in our Civil War.

Through motives of patriotism the Cheney Brothers took up the invention and organized a company, which included some of their friends in Boston, and secured one-half of the Chickering piano factory for the business. The building of a forging shop and the installation of the requisite machinery in the Cheney Brothers' factory, were the wonderful resources and executive ability of Mr. Cheney as well as the financial capacity of the Cheney Brothers.

My chief interest of late in visiting Mr. Cheney was to meet Mr. Cheney, whom I shall always remember with deepest affection. Windsor, Ct., March 3, 1904.
