Arrangements are on foot whereby the local transway company will acquire possession of what is known as the old Knox homestead at the Center. Caring for the Baby Is Robbed of Many Trials by Adopting a Rational System.

ittle about the care of babies, and this lack of knowledge is apt to make the task seem a very difficult one. Let his clothes be soft, warm and comfortable. We often fail to realize how much more sensitive he is to changes of temperature than we are, and are not careful enough to guard against them. The bath should never be neglected, for so much of his comfort depends upon it that he will be restess and cross without ft. Have the room warm and the water just warm enough for comfort. Get the bath tub in place, with towels and clean clothes hung on a chair before the fire, so they will be at hand when needed. Bathe him quickly, and wipe him dry with a very soft linen towel. 
