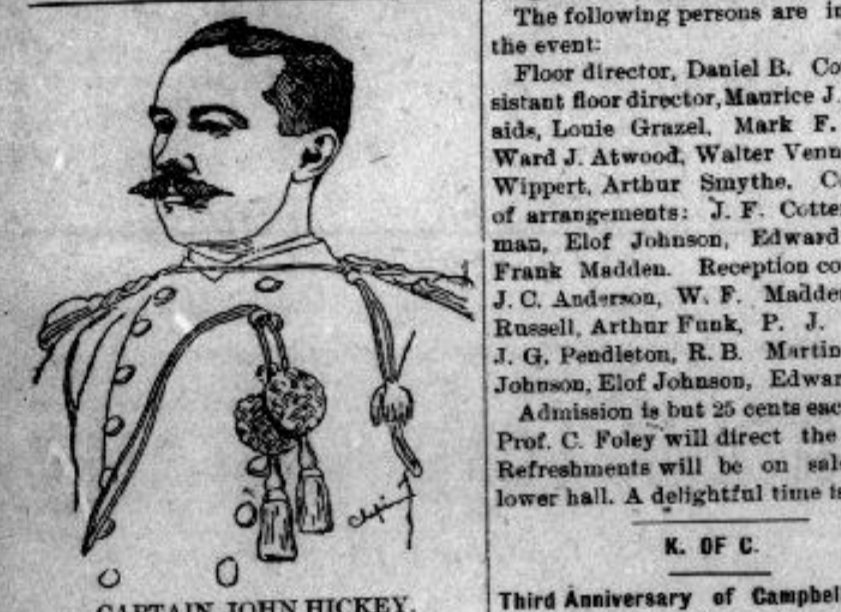




HICKEY IT IS.

The Empress of Japan, Haruko (popularly named the "Empress Spring") is a daughter of the noble house of Tokugawa, one of the five families of great rank, or court persons, from which a Mikado may choose his consort. Until her eighteenth year, when she was chosen to be the wife of the Mikado, she lived in the strictest seclusion in the palace. Her education was of a princely grade.

Great pains were taken to teach her literature, to develop her artistic taste and to school her in the writing of graceful Japanese calligraphy.

She is 54 years old, a year older than her husband. Having no children of her own, she is content to see the son of the Mikado, or crown prince, as he is called, to the throne, and to recognize him as her father. Her duties are to be a mother to the crown prince, and to be a friend to the Mikado.

She has no companion in the seclusion of her own apartments, and she is a typical German housewife.
