MORNING GAME.

The fourth of July was a great day for baseball in Manchester. Two victories from Rockville in one day filled to overflowing the cup of satisfaction for the Manchester enthusiasts, and gave vent to outbursts of exultation never equalled in this town. The morning game was the first, and was won by Manchester by a score of 13 to 10, in the greatest slugfest ever witnessed in Rockville. Moriarty, the pet of the Rockville, was hit for the first time, and was so disgusted, disappointed, humiliated and out of temper, that he could neither see nor hear his own actions. He fairly lost his head and acknowledged that he was all in. Rockville banked heavily on Moriarty's ability to win out from the Manchester, and gave him unbounded support and encouragement. They placed their dependence upon his arm, and sent him to the field with a considerable quantity of his good coin.

Great expectations were built up here as well as in Rockville upon the outcome of these two games and elaborate arrangements were made for handling the largest assembling ever seen on a base ball field here. These spectators were amply realized, and the large crowds were handled expeditiously, courteously, and promptly. Every possible facility was afforded the public for enjoying the game in this way.

The only run of the game for Rockville came in the sixth in this way. Dowling batted to left field, and Eddy, Wallace and Bailey got together on all out. The ball should have gone to Wallace or Eddy, but to get it between them caused him to rush in and the ball was not taken on the wing as it would have been had Wallace or Eddy been permitted to go for it alone. Graham singled to right, sending Dowling to second. Hart struck out. Stafford batted to Gurney and reached first on fielder's choice, but Graham was flied out at second and Dowling reached third on the play. Scanton drove a hot one at Plank, who muffed it, allowing Dowling to reach the rubber and make the only score of the game for Rockville. Donnelly struck out, leaving two men on bases. Manchester tied the score in her half of the sixth, in this way. Plank batted to Graham and didn't connect at first.

Bailey made a foul fly which Scanton begged in one of the better plays of the game. He fell down but held the ball and retired the batter. He was given a great cheer by everybody. O'Rourke followed with a three-bagger to deep right field, bringing every man home and sending the score to a tie.
