proper selection of clay and the improper treatment of the clay used. Ferruginous clays are the best, and chalky clays, as they are commonly known, are the poorest for road-building purposes. Some clays have a large percentage of sand to begin with and require less sand, while as a rule the chalky (sedimentary) clays have very little sand, or very fine sand, and are more difficult to get fully saturated with sharp sand so as to become unvielding and homogeneous.


Another cause of failure in the use of this particular clay is the fact that it rarely has iron enough to cement or bind the material together; hence it is easily broken up and washed away or blown away as dust.


