MEETING TONIGHT

AT CHENEY HALL OF PERSONS INTERESTED IN MAINTAINING BEDS AT CEDAR MOUNTAIN HOSPITAL.

Workers' Association To Be Formed for This Purpose and Subscriptions To Be Solicited From Employees—Cheney Brothers To Co-operate With Their Employees in Donating.

A meeting of the employees of Cheney Brothers representing the several departments of the firm here, will be held at Cheney hall this evening for the purpose of forming a workers' association to aid in the maintenance of beds at the Cedar Mountain Tuberculosis Hospital, same to be subject to the call of sick employees of this place.

At a meeting of the directors of the firm of Cheney Brothers held last week a committee was appointed to co-operate with the working men in this project.

The committee appointed is as follows: Horace B. Cheney, Wm. C. Cheney and Clifford D. Cheney. These gentlemen will be at the meeting tonight and explain to the working men the plan proposed by Cheney Brothers for the purpose named.

It is understood that the firm of Cheney Brothers will contribute one dollar for every dollar raised by the workingmen for the maintenance of beds at the Cedar Mountain Tuberculosis Hospital.

It is intended to organize a Workers' Association tonight by electing officers into whose keeping will be given the matter of raising the necessary money for the purpose in hand. Subscriptions will be solicited from the employees of Cheney Brothers in general. Such money is to be turned over to the Cedar Mountain Tuberculosis Hospital corporation and to be kept for use by employees of Cheney Brothers when overtaken by tuberculosis, so that they may be brought to the Cedar Mountain hospital and receive the necessary treatment.

It is believed that by having employees contribute to this fund, they will take a deeper interest in its maintenance and will more highly appreciate the benefits to be derived from same.

Cheney Brothers have frequently given large sums of money for purposes of this kind, but the opinion prevails that it will make the project more successful by having the employees interested to the extent of putting in money on their own account.

Thus too, employees will feel a little more independence in the matter and the services to be secured at the Cedar Mountain hospital will come to them as a right, because they have put in their money for the maintenance of same rather than as an entire gratuity from the firm of Cheney Brothers.

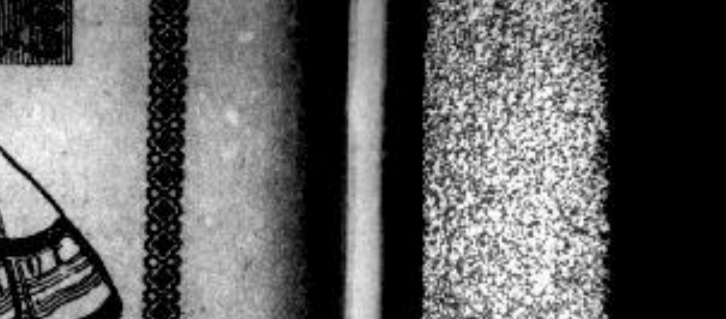

ANGLO-AMERICAN CONTEST STARTS.

Spirited Voting on the First Installments of the Competing Novels.

New York, Jan. 22 (AP).—That the public is taking a very lively interest in the New York Herald's Anglo-American competition is amply proved by the avalanche of votes and criticisms received since the contest opened last Sunday.

The votes have not yet been counted, and therefore no accurate estimate can be given as to the result of the first instalment. It is certain that both authors have a large number of staunch adherents.

Mary E. Wilkins' "The Shovelers of Alaska" was many votes by reason of its homely interest, strong character delineation and skilful blending of pathos and humor, the criticisms showing that the first instalment has made a deep impression on readers.

On the other hand, the vigorous manner in which Max Pemberton's old English tale, "Richard Secombe," opened, proved so fascinating to hundreds of readers that they hesitated no longer in lining up on the side of the British.

As soon as the editors of the Herald have finished reading the seven chapters in the award of seven cash prizes for the first week will be made and the winning criticisms will be published in the Herald. These criticisms will be given in full, and just what features of the stories interested the editors will be pointed out. They will also serve to indicate the general trend of opinion, and will help to form a basis for the final outcome which is likely to be of the most exciting character.

IS CONSUMPTION INHERITED?

Opinion of a Prominent Bacteriologist Gives a Spontaneous Lecture at Harvard College.

Professor H. C. Ernst in a recent lecture before Harvard Medical school discussed this theory at length. MAIL SERVICE

MAIL CARRIER TUBINGTON TO SUPPLY HILLSTOWN POSTOFFICE WITH MAIL VIA SO. MANCHESTER EACH DAY

Box Station To Be Opened On Pine Street Middle of February. Marked improvements Made in Postal Conventions During Past Two Years. Here So That in Quarter Century Proceeding That Time.

The people of Hillstown are of the opinion that by having their mail coming through the South Manchester postoffice they will get quicker service than at present. To that end they petitioned the authorities at Washington for a change of service, and their petition has been granted. The new system will go into effect February 1st. On and after that date Mail Carrier Turkington of Star Route No. 1 South Manchester postoffice, will bring a pouch to and from that office every forenoon. There will be but one delivery a day from the Hillstown postoffice. Heretofore Mail Carrier Turkington has been going to within about three-quarters of a mile of the Hillstown postoffice. The extension of the service will increase the amount of territory he has to cover, but will not give him any compensating increase in pay. However, the fact that the service on Ash and Villages streets has been transferred to the city delivery carrier takes off some of the work from Mail Carrier Turkington, and it is thought that this extension to Hillstown will probably about equal the elimination of the Ash and Villages street service to him. This change also means increased work for the South Manchester postoffice force without any increase of compensation.

It is quite possible that in due course of time the Hillstown postoffice will be discontinued, and all service given the Hillstown people come from and by way of the South Manchester postoffice. Beginning February 15th a sub-station is to be established at 30 Pine street in the store conducted by Samuel Nelson. Here facilities for transacting money order and registered letter business, and for the sale of stamps and other postal supplies will be furnished for people of the West side, thus adding very materially to their post office conveniences.

It will therefore be seen that the post office facilities for South Manchester and its suburbs are being very greatly improved, much having been done in this matter by Postmaster W. B. Cheney within the past two years in fact more than had been done in a quarter of a century previous to that period. This demonstrates the fact that it pays to look sometimes. These various changes have come about largely through the agency of the citizens.

BROKE HIS LEG

John Matchett Taken to the Hartford Hospital Yesterday Afternoon.

While endeavoring to place a smoke stack on the boiler house of his shop yesterday forenoon, John Matchett, the South Main street blacksmith, fell from the roof and was precipitated to the bridge below, from which he tumbled into the brook breaking two bones in his left leg between the knee and ankle. The bones protruded through the flesh, making an ugly compound fracture. Dr. W. B. Tinker was summoned and after rendering such first aid to the injured as was necessary, had Mr. Matchett removed to the Hartford hospital for further treatment. He will be received from the hospital this morning bringing the information that the bones were set yesterday afternoon and that Mr. Matchett put in as comfortable a night as could be expected. The doctors express the opinion that he is not injured internally. He fell a distance of about 15 feet. He was endeavoring to carry a heavy smoke stack up the ladder alone, when he lost his balance and fell.

NEW CARS HERE. Large, Roomy, Smooth Running, Comfortable and Attractive. Two of the new double-truck trolley cars are now in commission on the local line, and others are now being wired at the Vernon street car barns in Hartford. It is expected that seven of these modern cars will be put in service on the local tramway. These new cars are painted yellow, and have the word "Connection" painted on the sides of each car. The cars are equipped with four 40-horse-power motors with large controllers technically known as K. K. Air brakes are placed at each end, and also hand brakes. The cars will seat forty-four persons each. There are twenty-four cross seats in the center and ten side seats on the ends. The seats are of rattan. It is intended to have illuminated signs on the sides and ends of each car so that one may know which car to take at night.

These new cars run nice and smooth like the large double truck car which has been in use on the cross town line but lately has been transferred to the Hartford line since the new bridge was opened. This will make a total of eight of the large double truck cars on the line between this place and Hartford. It is hoped and expected that when this new service is fully installed, and in smooth working order, the running time between here and Hartford will be proportionately reduced. The cars have ample power, are strong, smooth running and speedy. There will be no trouble at all in making more rapid time if schedules are arranged accordingly. One new car which was intended for this line was put on the Glastonbury line yesterday.
