Report of Committee on By Laws As Published in Full Here To Be Read, Discussed Altered, Enlarged or Curtailed as Meeting May Determine—Suggestious Cheerfully Invited.

A mass meeting will be held at Cheney hall Friday evening, Mar. 6, at 7:45, in the interest of the Tuberculosis Free Bed Fund Association of Cheney Brothers.

At this meeting the report of the committee on by-laws will be made and all employees of Cheney Brothers, whether they have signed as members of the association or not, are invited by the committee to attend. The committee have been diligently at work upon the task assigned them and have drafted by-laws which in their judgment seem to meet the requirements of the case as at present understood. However, the report of the committee will be read before the meeting and anyone having any amendments or alterations or improvements to make will be heard.

Any suggestions for the improvement of the proposed by-laws will be cheerfully received. It is intended that these by-laws shall be thoroughly discussed and if any person present knows of any way in which they may be made better, or by which they can be made to cover the needs of the association more fully such information will be gladly received and incorporated into the by-laws before they are finally adopted.

It is desired to be understood that the interests of all employees of Cheney Brothers are to be conserved in this movement and every assurance is extended to all that there will be absolute equality shown. There will be no privileged interests in the management or workings of the association. Neither race, nationality nor religion will enter into the problem. The general good of all is the aim sought to be accomplished. It therefore behooves every employee of Cheney Brothers to show an interest in the movement by attending this meeting and offering any suggestions.

Concluded From Page One. They may be deemed necessary or advisable. The following committees have prepared the draft of the by-laws which will be presented at the meeting Friday evening, March 6, as indicated above.

Edward I. Taylor, chairman; Fred J. Fendall, treasurer; Ethel B. Brainerd, secretary; executive committee, Geo. Davidson, Patrick G. Hayes, Ernest Luntz, Antonio Buba, Adam Scholdge, Mrs. Eleanor McCann.

The by-laws as prepared by the above committee are as follows: Article No. 1. The name of the association shall be "The Tuberculosis Free Fund Association of Cheney Brothers," and shall be for the Employees of Cheney Brothers only.

Article No. 2. Its purpose shall be to prevent as far as possible the spread of the one disease, Tuberculosis, and to help as far as possible to prevent persons that are affected with the disease. Article No. 3. The association shall elect annually at its first meeting in January, a Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer and an Executive Committee that shall consist of six persons and all officers shall remain in office until their successors assume their respective offices.

Article No. 4. The chairman shall preside at all meetings of the association, he shall appoint committees for various parts of the work which are not otherwise provided for. He shall call all regular and special meetings, and shall at the end of each year appoint three persons as Auditors, whose duty it shall be to audit the reports and accounts of officers, and report at the first meeting of January in each year.

Article No. 5. All persons in the employ of Cheney Brothers shall be entitled to receive aid from this Association, providing they shall have been in the employ of said Cheney Brothers for at least (90) ninety days and do upon becoming afflicted with the disease, make application for same.

Article No. 6. If the patient shall prefer to be treated at Cedar Hill Hospital for treatment, this Association shall pay the expense of such patient while being treated at said hospital upon a bill presented by said hospital. Should the patient prefer to be treated at home or at some other place except at either of the above named hospitals, this Association shall pay said patient the sum of Five Dollars (\$5.00) per week while patient is being treated, or until such time as the patient is able to support him or herself as the case may be.

Article No. 7. The By-Laws may be revised or amended only by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any meeting. The Leves of a Violinist. 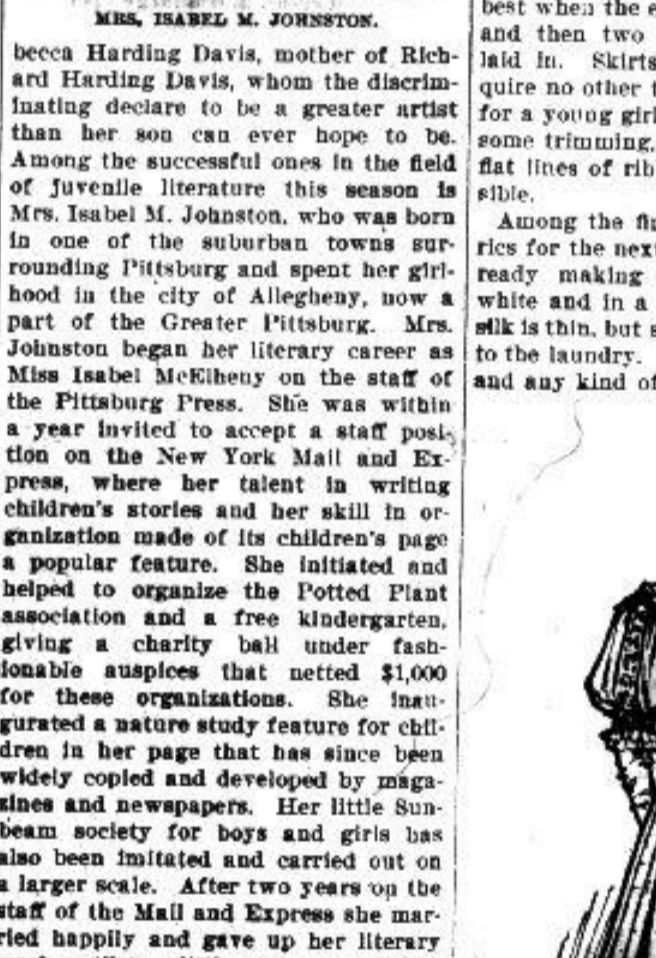

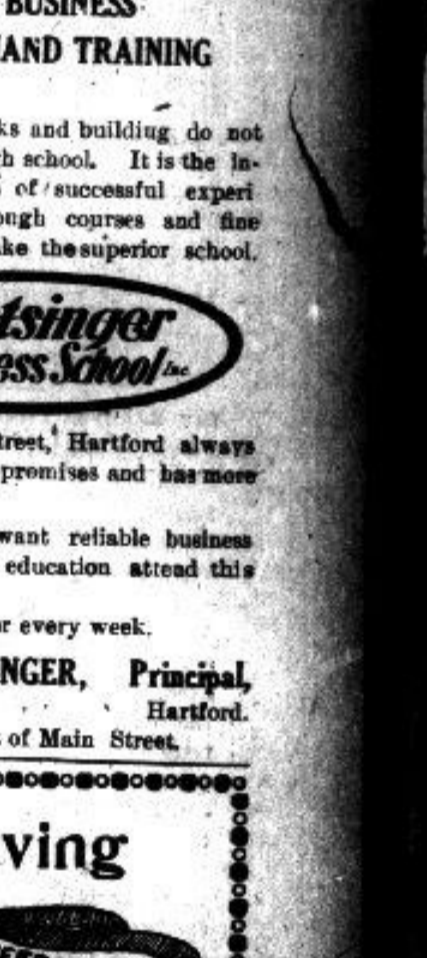
