### SILK EXHIBIT

### WELL ENTERTAINED

SHANGHAI AND HIS COMPANY GAVE TWO DELIGHTFUL PERFORMANCES HERE YESTERDAY.

Large and Enthusiastic Through Assembly at High School Hall—Edmond's Music as Well as Original Method of Pleasing Audience—Second Visit More Than Tripled Attendance.

The fourth in the series of entertainments given in the Popular Entertainment Club room at High School Hall last evening with the Shanghai Company as the attraction. The performance was given during the afternoon for the benefit of the school children of the Ninth District school and about four hundred persons attended. The evening entertainment attracted a gathering of between seven and eight hundred persons, and was a fine success in every particular.

The Shanghai Company opened their entertainment course in October 1906 on a Saturday evening with an attendance of about one third as large as that of last evening. Shanghai's efforts on his first visit were so successful and the time passed abroad to such an extent that he was welcomed by large and enthusiastic gatherings at the afternoon and evening performances yesterday.

The novelty of his work places it almost in a class by itself. On Shanghai's first visit people here had no idea of the manner in which the entertainment to be given, but they showed their appreciation of the very excellent performances in the large attendance of yesterday afternoon and evening.

Shanghai's entertainment followed in a large measure the course mapped out by him in October 1906, as explained with some detail in these columns at that time. The lecture portion of the entertainment related to the customs, superstitions and religious observances of the Mohol Indians, their methods and their rain dances, all of which proved to be highly interesting and instructive to the large and enthusiastic audience assembled. Shanghai's very excellent and original method of pleasing the audience was also highly assisted by young ladies who gave performances on violin and piano, and also furnished readings and vocal selections, all of which were of a high order and were heartily appreciated and enthusiastically applauded.

Shanghai exhibited some of the parlor magic feats which he showed on his first visit and also added a number of new "tricks" which he said he had learned from the white man. While the tricks and illusions were highly entertaining in themselves the colloquial chat with which Shanghai favored the audience, the sage observations he made and the details of the features of our so-called civilization.

He repeated his comparisons of last year as between the medicine man of the Indian and the physician of the white man and his observations on the difference between the medicine man of the Indian rather than the physician of the white man. He compared some of our superstitions with those of the Mohol Indians. His conversation was certainly dull and entertaining as well as instructive. The entertainment was a success in every particular and the audience was highly entertained and enjoyed the evening.
