Mr. Gushanan is a thoroughly practical man in this work. He is the prime mover in the East Side Workmen's Club of Hartford, is in personal touch with the workings of the Free Bed Fund Movement. He will give practical illustrations of the good work which is being done in this way, and explain why it is highly essential to every community where persons are employed in mills to be attached to this movement, as is proposed by the employees of Cheney Brothers. Mr. Gushanan is a very enthusiastic worker in this cause and is well informed on the subject as any man in this vicinity. It will therefore be a great benefit to the people here who are employed by Cheney Brothers to hear what he has to say upon the subject.

After the meeting of next Monday evening it is intended that a series of tribulation of the collection cards and to start in a practical manner the active work of the Tuberculosis Free Bed Fund Association of Cheney Brothers in this place at once.

Already there are three applications from tubercular patients for assistance here in town, and the funds that are to be raised by the collectors will be put into immediate use in behalf of those persons. It is estimated that the average number of tubercular cases in works such as we have here would be from two to three persons in a thousand by which it might be estimated that on the books of the Tuberculosis Free Bed Fund Association of Cheney Brothers anywhere from six to nine cases pending at any one time.

There are over 6,000 persons employed in Cheney Brothers mills and if an average collection of fifty cents each is secured by means of these collection cards there will be an active working fund of \$300,000, immediately available for the benefit of such as may be found to be in need of the assistance of this fund. It will be remembered that Cheney Brothers are to give dollar for dollar, dime for dime, and penny for penny, with every dollar, dime and penny collected. A fund of \$3,000 judiciously administered in this work is susceptible of doing a great deal of good in this community. It is urgently requested that all persons who are employees of Cheney Brothers attend this meeting at Assembly hall next Monday in order that they may acquire better knowledge of the workings of this Free Bed Fund Movement, and enter in upon the work here with a clear and intelligent understanding of same. Should anybody desire any information after Mr. Gushanan closes his regular remarks, he will be pleased to answer any questions that may be put to him.

NEW INDUSTRY

Manchester Business Men Considering Likelihood of Bringing Same to This Town.

A special meeting of the Manchester Business Men's association was held at Odd Fellows hall Monday evening to take action upon a proposition made by the Security Manufacturing company with a view to locating in the building lately operated by the Eastern Biscuit Company on Main street over north. Forty members of the Association were present. Giles Allison of New York represented the Security Register and Manufacturing Company of St. Louis, which concern also controls the manufacture of the Roth Universal High Pressures One-Man Jacks, the latter being made in New York City. William Pestell represented the Worcester Steel Foundry Company of Worcester, Mass. A coalition of these three industries is proposed to be known as the Security Manufacturing Company. These gentlemen had secured an option for the purchase of the plant of the Eastern Biscuit Company and presented a proposition whereby they proposed to move their entire works to that building, provided suitable financial aid was forthcoming from business men and others in this place. Under the proposed new organization the capitalization was to be \$400,000, \$100,000 of which would be represented by the Roth Universal High Pressures concern, Messrs. Allison and Pestell asked that people of this place subscribe for shares of stock of the proposed new concern, one-fourth of which was to be paid after the Security Manufacturing Company purchased the plant over north and moved their machinery and materials from St. Louis and from New York to this place; one fourth payment to be made when the machinery was in full operation; one fourth to be paid in balance to be paid on time notes at the pleasure of the subscriber. After hearing the explanations made by these gentlemen and asking a number of questions regarding their proposed plant and their production, generally it was voted that the Industrial committee of the Manchester Business Men's Association be enlarged by four members as follows: J. V. Strickland, J. T. Robertson, E. S. Eia and H. O. Bowers. The committee as originally constituted was E. L. G. Hohenstiel, J. A. Fish and E. T. Merritt. This enlarged Industrial Committee was authorized to take the proposition of Messrs. Allison and Pestell into consideration to investigate the same thoroughly and report within a week. Measures were to be taken to securing perfection. It will have six men and forty voices in the chorus with ten soloists.

From time to time applications have been made to the local lodge of Orangemen to provide burial places for members who had no homes or means of their own at death. The case of James T. McConnell, who, although a member, came under their protection in the manner noted in our ordinary column, caused a consultation of officers to consider the matter and they determined that the best and most economical way would be for the lodge to have a large burial plot of their own, and thus be in position to provide suitable burial for cases of the kind mentioned above. Should it be found necessary there is more space available which may be added to their burial plot. Henceforth they will be in a position to handle such cases without any further difficulty from that source.

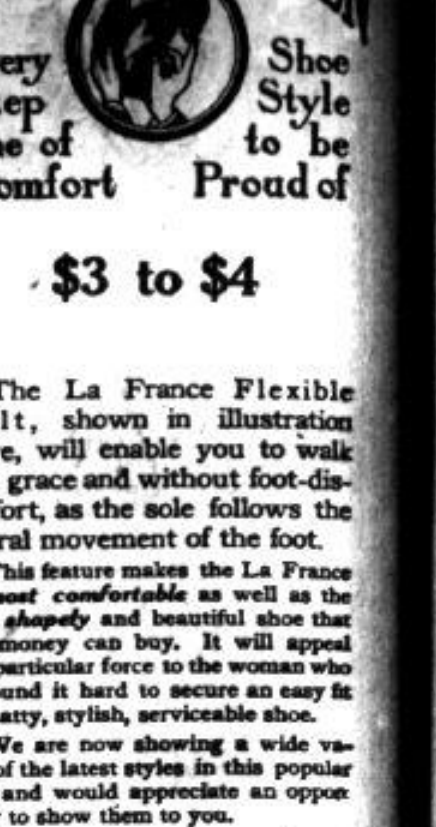

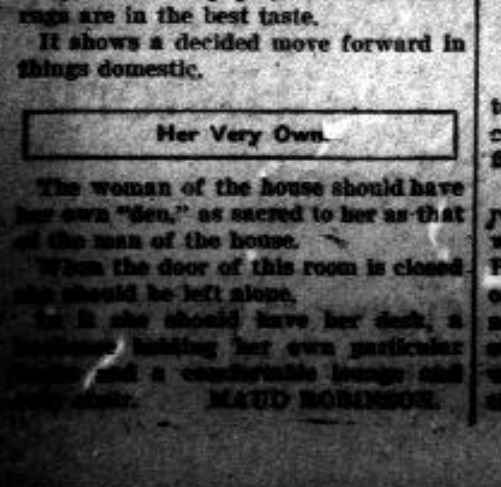

Three degrees were given, and the working required the presence of the candidates in the hall from noon until 10 p. m.

For some time, Campbell Council was the infant organization of the town, and it was not especially strong in membership or accomplishments. Soon its growth began, and in a few years its membership nearly doubled. Five years ago, the Council secured club rooms in the Ferris building. From time to time; the furnishings were improved, and at the present time, the organization has an attractive quarters as are maintained by any club in town. It is one of the few local organizations which keeps club rooms open permanently for young men, and in this way is accomplishing much good of the kind resulting from providing for young men club rooms under proper regulations. As a social and fraternal organization, Campbell Council has forged to the front rapidly the past interest and work of the officers and members, and it now occupies a place in the front ranks of the leading local organizations.

Next week, Campbell Council will give a five nights' bazaar in the armory, and the way the committees and members have gone about the work of planning for the affair suggests somewhat the progressiveness which has characterized the Council from the date of its institution. 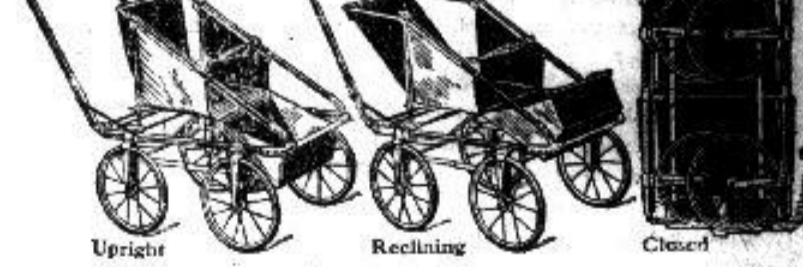

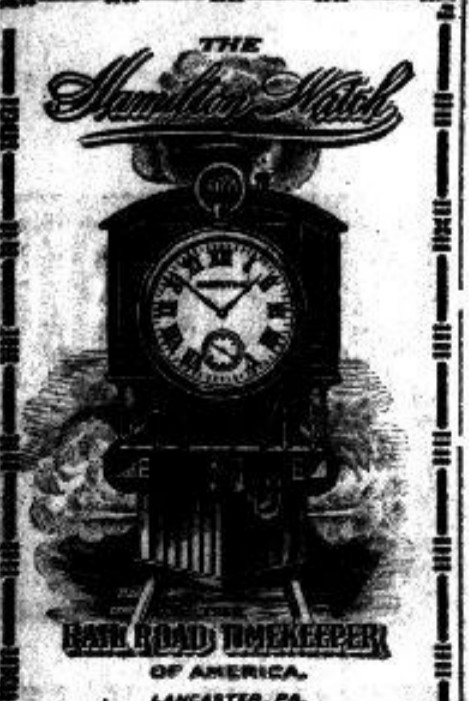
