Some allowance should of course be made for lack of well-defined symptoms in many cases, but the diagnosis can oftentimes be cleared up by a blood test, which will be made at the state laboratory free of charge. This prompt reporting of typhoid will often enable the health officer to recognize early some common source of infection and enable him to direct the cause of the trouble. The physician should not
