PROHIBITIONISTS HERE

HOLD STATE CONVENTION, ADOPT PLATFORM AND NOMINATE STATE OFFICERS.

Had Out Water Wagon and Brought Two Copies Theater Showers. One for Each of Principal Speakers, honorable Oliver W. Stewart of Chicago, and Frederick E. Britten of Boston.

The State Convention of the Prohibition party was held here this week opening Tuesday afternoon in Odd Fellows hall and closing Wednesday evening in the Assembly room. Fresh floral decorations were chosen, nominations for state officers were made, a platform was adopted, addresses were made by Fred E. Britten of Boston, Mass., by Oliver W. Stewart of Chicago, by Matthew E. O'Brien of Boston.

It is with mingled feelings of both sadness and pleasure that I stand before you today to tender to you a few words of welcome. As I look upon this body of delegates, I miss so many familiar faces, whom I have been wont to meet and greet in bygone days in these Conventions. How many of those who have been associated with me in the past, in this work have crossed the dark river to receive their welcome on the other shore. I recall a few of those valiant fighters in our ranks, who meet with us no more. John B. Smith, Thos. H. L. Talcott, Elijah C. Barton, C. D. Rice, Geo. P. Roger, J. A. Lewis, Rev. S. M. Hammond, Rev. H. A. Delano, and last but not least, Rev. H. W. Stewart, with whom I was so long associated in this county for so many years, and who gave his life to and for this great cause, being taken away in the prime of life, when we needed his help, and counsel so much. But while these and many others have passed from our sight, the remembrance of their deeds and loyalty to this cause will ever linger with us, and be a blessing and inspiration to us as we toil on.

Hail and farewell, O faithful souls, who meet no more with us on earth; We pause to reverently pay a loyal tribute to thy worth.

Hail and farewell, our comrades true! Sleep thou the deep sleep of the just: "Thy memory will't be green. And sweet, and blossom in the dust."

An informal conference of the State Central Committee was held Tuesday afternoon and was called to order by State Chairman E. L. G. Hoehenthal of South Manchester, secretary.

Many of us know what it has been to work in this cause while feeling with full force this truth:

"The weary watching wave by wave, And yet the tide rolls onward; We climb, like coral, grave by grave, But pave a path that's seaward; And there's a man who'll be the first To tread in the additional lines: 'My've been here in many a year, But never strength we borrow; And where the vanguard camps today, The year shall rest tomorrow.'"

I have been chosen by the party in Striving to give you these words of welcome, perhaps because there are but few of us left here of the original 50 who voted for St. John and Daniel in 1854. Mason Agard, that old Abolition war hero, who is now in his 88th year being one of them I doubt not but if today another fight for the truth should break out he would want to be in it. The first public intimation that there was such a movement on foot was this item in our local paper of October 11th: "A St. John and Daniel Club has been formed here this week. The organization includes ladies as well as men and numbers 41 members. Its officers are: President, R. N. Stanley; first vice president, J. B. Weaver; secretary, Edward Agard; treasurer, Frank Ladd. The club will meet at 7.45 every Monday evening at the residence of J. N. Spencer on Park street."

In the next week's paper the fight began—not against the liquor traffic, but against the new party by some Republicans, nearly all of the 88 having been in the Republican party. In speaking of this new party, 1854, the State of Connecticut in Convention assembled, we were glad to see that the voters were the prohibitionists in the past, and the endorsement of the new party was the endorsement of the old party.

Cheney Brothers are helping materially in banishing the mosquito pest from this place. They send a man around armed with a measure of kerosene oil, with instructions to pour some of the oil down the openings to the sewers and drains hereabouts. It is found that kerosene is fatal to mosquitoes, and this timely precaution adds materially to the comfort and well-being of the people of South Manchester.

It is a sad fact that in the past this community is nearly free from mosquitoes. A considerable portion of this immunity is due to the precautions taken by Cheney Brothers in the placement in the use of kerosene in the places where mosquitoes breed.

NINTH SCHOOL DISTRICT BUSINESS MEN'S OUTING

COMPLETE REPORT OF CHAIRMAN HOWELL CHENEY FOR YEAR JUST CLOSED.

Interesting Information for Taxpayers and Parents Regarding Work of Largest School in Town is Given Below—Document Well Worth to Be Kept for Reference.

The School Committee submits here with the following report of the conduct of the school in the Ninth District incorporated for the school year of 1907 and 8.

RECEIPTS AND EXPENSES.

The treasurer's report shows that total cost of schools for the year has been \$88,082.27. This amount has been paid for as follows:

 By the State appropriation 1,709 pupils 3,842.25

 By tuition fees of outside pupils 250.00

The expenses for the year 1907-8 have increased over those of 1906-7 by \$2,048.75 which is accounted for as follows:

 By library 117.04
 By incidentals 391.48

The net cost to the town was further reduced by an increase in the State appropriation of \$180.00, and an increase in the commutation grant from the State of \$60.00, making the total increase of expenses borne by the town \$1,506.75. This increase in expenditure was more than accounted for by the addition of new permanent teachers, and it was only by means of material economies in text books, and supplies, fuel and light that we were able to keep within the appropriation of \$717.75.

NEW TEACHERS.

The additions to the permanent teaching force were unusually large. At Cooper Hill one supervisor and four normal training teachers were replaced with two permanent teachers at an increase cost of \$265.00. An unusually large number of classes in the Kindergarten necessitated one paid assistant for ten weeks, and the cost of this was more than accounted for by the attendance of the children. An extra class of 94 in the High School required an additional teacher in this grade for the last two weeks of the term, who will be continued next year. Instead of the disciplinary room tried last year a room for backward and deficient pupils was established for 28 weeks. This was discontinued next year with another room of the same nature. Further additions for fractional parts of the year, which will be made permanent, were a nurse for 28 weeks, a primary teacher for 25 weeks, and another primary teacher for 28 weeks. The total cost of the six permanent teachers, a nurse, and a temporary assistant in the Kindergarten was \$1,300.25. The total cost of the teachers last year's salaries were increased by \$450.97, or less than 2 per cent.

JANITORS AND WATCHMEN.

The care of the Cooper Hill school, which by an oversight had been previously borne by the district, and the cost of janitors and watchmen, the latter on account of the installation of signal boxes requiring hourly rounds, made these expenses \$426.50 larger than last year.

The total pay roll was \$830,822.27, which was an increase over last year of \$2,313.90.

FUEL.

A year ago there was a notable increase in the cost of fuel, which was found to be due partially to defects in the heating system of the new school building, but largely to charging the evening school an institution, amounting to \$1,000.00. The cost of fuel was carefully estimated and was made of the coal and light used, and as a result a change for heating and lighting the building for evening school of \$15,000.00 was made.
