## BURGULARS ENTER STORE

Of Balch & Brown De Depot Square and Carry of Considerable Bevy.

The store of Balch & Brown, on Depot Square, was entered by burglars Wednesday night and plunder aggregating in value probably \$500 was carried off. Entrance was effected through an unfastened window at the rear of the building by placing a plank reaching from the ground to the window sill and raising the window.

A number of watches ranging in value from \$1 to \$25 high priced French wrist and other pipes, 74 fountain pens of standard and expensive make, shoes, men's clothing, underwear, cut by boys, scarf pins, etc., were purloined. It is quite impossible for the proprietors to make an exact inventory of their losses. They operate a drug store, a men's clothing and outfitting store, a shoe store, a department for men's hats, also underwear, dress and negligee shirts, neck wear, jewelry, etc.

The burglars managed to make away safely with their plunder and at this writing have not been discovered. The police are carefully working on several clues and are of the opinion that they will be able soon to bring the culprits to justice.

Officer Thomas J. Smith was on duty at the time of the burglary, and was in the office of Balch & Brown, who is spending a few days in Canaan setting the estate of his brother, the late George Reed. Officer Smith did not observe anything unusual at the store during the night, nor did he see any suspicious persons in that vicinity. Persons who chanced to be on the square late in the night did not notice that anything was wrong. The burglars departed at the rear of the store the same as they entered.

## TO BUILD AT ONCE

Three Contracts To Be Awarded in Hartford

The New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad Company will, within a week, award contracts for the construction of three trolley lines in this state which will mean an aggregate expenditure of about \$1,000,000. The first contract is for a line between Wethersfield and Middletown, eleven miles, will be opened to-day. A three-mile line will be built from Hartford to Bloomfield. The third new line to be constructed will be six miles long and extend from Williamstown to South Coventry. The three lines aggregate twenty miles in length and it is figured that the construction will cost \$600,000 a mile.—Courant

## FIRE DISTRICT MEETING

TO BE HELD AT TOWN HALL NEXT THURS. EVE.—IMPORTANT MATTERS TO BE ADJUSTED.

Report of Committee on By-Laws. Adoption of By-Laws for South Manchester Fire District. Formation of Fire Department for said District Chief Features of said Special Meeting.

A special meeting of the South Manchester Fire District will be held at the Town Hall Thursday evening, July 23, at 8 o'clock. The principal purpose of the meeting are to take action in regard to the adoption of by-laws for the district, and to authorize the formation of a fire department for said district.

It is explained to the officers that the South Manchester Fire Department has no legal existence, as such. The statute laws of the state provide for the maintenance of a fire district and of a fire department as a portion of the legal equipment of each district. The present arrangement is simply that of a volunteer fire department. While the proposed new arrangement will not deprive any of the companies of any rights and privileges which they now enjoy, it will legalize them and bring their acts fully up to the standard of the law within the sanction of the law.

The companies will elect their own officers under the new plan, the same as heretofore, will use the hose, ladders and equipment, and will have the legal right to work as such fire companies, without having their officers liable for any infringement of the law, or for any destruction of adjoining property in case of fire. As matters now stand they have not this legal right. The proposed change will simply place the fire department upon a legal basis, and give the sanction of law to their acts while in the discharge of their duties as such fire companies.

Following is the draft of proposed by-laws which the committee have drawn up, and which will be presented to the meeting for adoption, or amendment, such other action as the district meeting may see fit to take:

1. This District shall be known as The South Manchester Fire District.

2. The purpose for which this district is formed for the preservation, maintenance and protection of property within said district from fire and to extinguish fires occurring thereon.

3. The officers of this district shall be a President, a Treasurer, a Collector and two Auditors, each of whom shall be elected by ballot and hold office from the time of his election until the next annual meeting of said district or until his successor is duly elected or appointed.

4. The President, Treasurer and Clerk of said district shall be known as a Board of Fire Commissioners.

5. Said President, Treasurer and Clerk or a majority of them acting as said Board of Fire Commissioners shall have the care, control and management of the business and property of said district; shall organize a Fire Department of said district, and formulate By-Laws for said Fire Department, subject to the approval of a majority of the legal voters of said district voting at a duly warned meeting of said district; shall make rules and regulations for the proper discipline and control of said Fire Department; shall have the right to appoint and to remove Firefighters for said Fire District, and said President, Treasurer and Clerk, acting as said Board of Fire Commissioners may, for cause, after notice and a hearing, dismiss the Chief of said Fire Department, either of his assistants or the Superintendent of Fire Alarm Telegraph.

6. All officers of this district shall be elected by ballot at the Annual Meeting of said district, but vacancies in office may be filled by the President, Treasurer and Clerk acting as said Board of Fire Commissioners, to hold office until the next annual meeting of said Fire District.

7. All officers of this district shall make report to the Annual Meeting of said district and they shall incorporate therein such recommendations as they shall deem proper for the efficiency of said district and its Fire Department.

8. The treasurer shall have the custody of all funds belonging to said fire district and shall disclose same under the direction of the President, Treasurer and Clerk acting as said Board of Fire Commissioners; but no expenditure shall be made except from funds appropriated by the district meeting of said district.

9. The Annual Meeting of this district shall be held on the Third Tuesday of August in each year, and Special Meetings may be called at any time by the President, Treasurer and Clerk. Notice of the time and place of holding all meetings of said district and the business to be transacted thereat shall be given by the President, Treasurer and Clerk.

10. The new ribbon mill arrived here yesterday and will be employed in weaving velvet ribbons. The velvet ribbon looms now in use here will be transferred to the new mill.
