Back around 1829, says the American Vehicle, in explaining it, when the transportation of goods, wares and merchandise was almost entirely by wagon.

In east Tennessee much difficulty was experienced by reason of the rough roads, and there were frequent mishaps, mostly from the wagons overturning.

Dr. Buck overhauled the outfit, and, abandoning the wagon, devised a long board, which was set directly on the axle or hung below, and the stores were loaded in such a manner that there were no further shocks.

Now we have the buckboard, both in carriage and automobile form, conforming closely to the original idea, though few suspect the source of it.—San Francisco Chronicle.

A FAMOUS KEY.

It Was Thrown Into Loch Leven When Queen Mary Escaped.

The interesting key of Loch Leven castle is still in existence. It was found in the lake and is supposed to have been the one thrown in by the young Douglas when Mary, queen of Scots, made her escape. The key was originally in the possession of William Hamper, Esq., who presented it to Sir Walter Scott, having first had an engraving made of it.

The castle of Loch Leven is situated on an island of about two acres near the northern extremity of the lake. The castle was built by James Hamilton of Carberry hill and joined the fragments was carried captive into Edinburgh and on the following day committed to Loch Leven castle. On the 25th of March, 1568, he attempted to escape thence in the disguise of a laundress, but was frustrated.
