HURT IN RUNAWAY

Mrs. F. A. Verplanck of This Place Seriously Injured Yesterday

NOMINATIONS

All nominations for the MANCHESTER DIRECT PRIMARY OF THE REPUBLICAN, DEMOCRATIC and PROHIBITION parties, to be held Tuesday, September 15, must be filed with the town clerk on or before Monday, August 31.

Every nomination must be proposed by an elector registered on the enrollment list of the party for which the nomination is made, and must be endorsed by ten electors so enrolled.

One elector may propose or endorse nominations for as many officers as he sees fit.

Nominations are to be made for the following:

- (1) Five Selectmen (1) One Collector of Taxes. (3) Three Assessors—one for three (3) years, one for one (1) year, and one for one (1) year.

- (1) One Registrar of Voters. (4) Four Constables. (3) Three Grand Jurors. (1) One Agent Town Deposit Fund.

- (2) Two Board of Relief. (1) Two Auditor. (2) Two School Visitors—one for three years, one for unexpired term.

- (1) One Tree Warden. (2) Two Directors of Public Library.

- (1) One Judge of Probate. (2) Two Representatives. (6) Six Justices of the Peace.

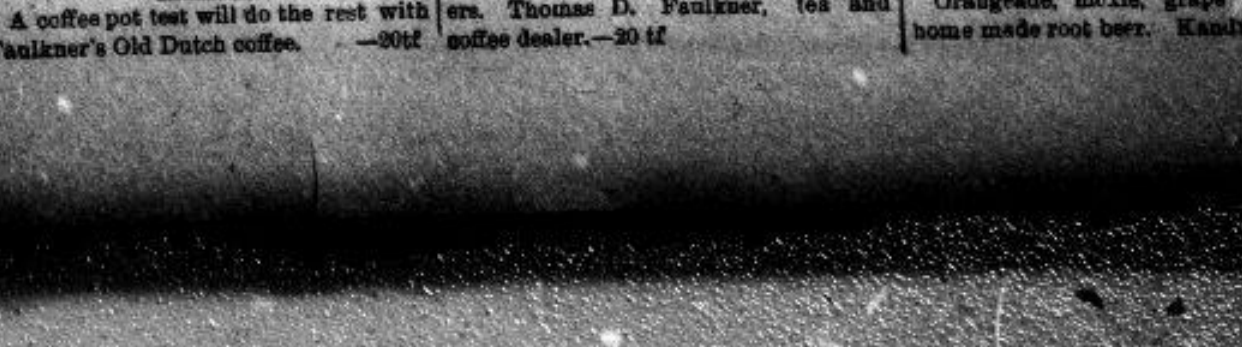
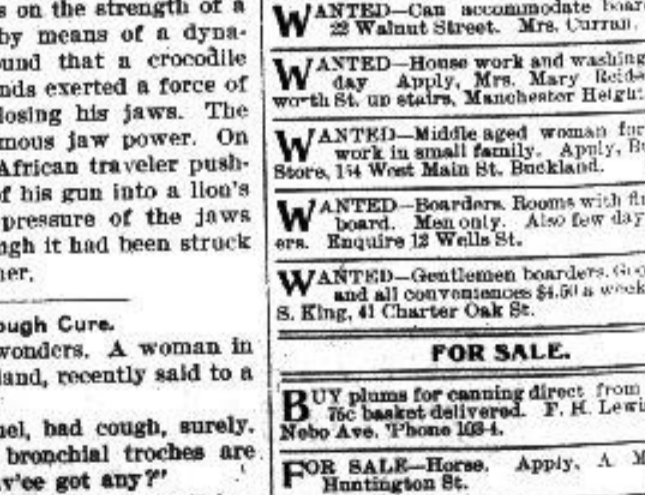
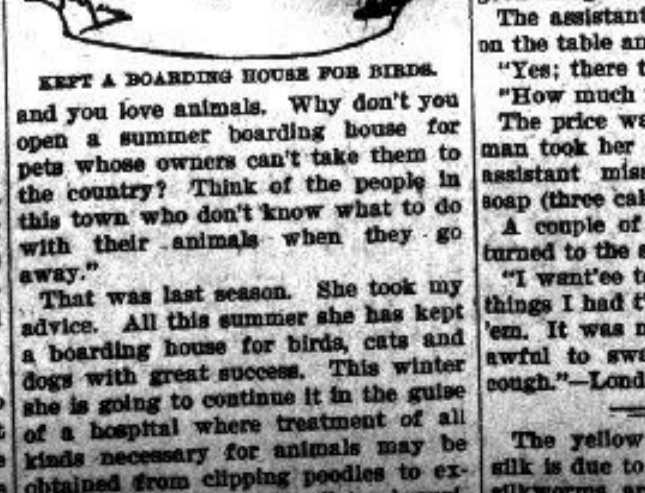
