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LABOR FAIBERS ASSAIL GOMPERS.

Resent His Attempt to "Deliver" Their Vote.

HIGH A. F. OF L. OFFICIALS.

First and Sixth Vice Presidents of the Organization Criticize Their Chief For Promise to Hand Over Vote to Bryan on Gompers' Appeal Through Under Table.

"My purpose in coming to Washington was to arrange with Mr. Gompers for perfect co-operation between the organization under him and the anti-democratic committee in August. He did arrange with Mr. Gompers to deliver the labor vote. But Mr. Gompers has found it harder to perform than it was to promise. His activity in the interests of Bryan and of the calm assumption that 'the organization under him'—'his' men—would vote as he sells to have created a dissonance in the ranks of labor."

This dissonance began to show itself almost immediately after Mr. Mack and Mr. Gompers had reached an agreement about 'their' organizations. The first protest came from the Western Federation of Miners, who were made by many who question the wisdom of the labor vote. That is what Chairman Mack of the Democratic committee said in August. He did arrange with Mr. Gompers to deliver the labor vote. But Mr. Gompers has found it harder to perform than it was to promise. His activity in the interests of Bryan and of the calm assumption that 'the organization under him'—'his' men—would vote as he sells to have created a dissonance in the ranks of labor."

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Such are the facts. Here lie the lives of these two men, side by side, before you. It is yours to judge between them, for one or the other of the men who have lived these lives must soon become president of the United States.

"Gompers" has had splendid success, establishing government, conducting delicate diplomatic negotiations, erecting gigantic engineering works, and securing the lasting benefits of all the nations of the earth.

The other has contented himself with leading a life of quietude, editing a weekly newspaper. Think of all that! Lay it calmly and dispassionately before your intelligence, and you will see that the heart of hearts of which these two men you, as a good and patriotic citizen, should give your vote and that the Federation of Labor is to be made an annex of the Democratic party in the pending campaign."

Chief among the reasons for object to Mr. Gompers' assumption of power to deliver the labor vote to Bryan are two high officials of the federation, one of them next in command to Gompers himself. They are James Duncan, first vice president of the American Federation of Labor, and Daniel J. Keefe, sixth vice president.

Vice President Duncan, who is president of the Granite Cutters' union, says: "The labor movement of this country is now, as heretofore, independent of parties. The labor movement admonishes each organized worker to cast his vote for the candidate of strict accordance with his conscience as to what would be the best for the whole people."

Vice President Keefe, who is a member of the federation's executive council and president of the Longshoremen's union, expressly repudiates Mr. Gompers' bargain to 'deliver' the labor vote and says: "The American Federation of Labor is not committed to any political party, nor has any candidate for president been endorsed by the executive council. Personally I am going to vote for William H. Taft because as secretary of war he did more to enforce laws in favor of organized labor than any of his predecessors."

Mr. Gompers has undoubtedly succeeded admirably in one thing. He has secured the consent of a large number of trades unions, who believe that each has a right to vote for himself and that coercion of any kind to elect him has been exercised to influence any man's vote.

BUCKNER BOLTS BRYAN

Veteran Kentucky Democrat Criticizes Nebraskan.

Declares For Taft as a Man Qualified by Training and Experience to Discharge the Duties of the Presidency.

General Simon Bolivar Buckner of Kentucky, the nominee of the sound money Democrats in 1860, having been asked by the national money Democrat of Missouri for an expression of opinion on the present political situation, says:

Mr. Bryan's platform has many planks which express an ardent wish to have the government controlled by a party which is not pledged, but it seems inexplicable to suggest any policy which would result in the ruin of the country.

Three Union Presidents For Taft. T. I. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America, takes direct issue with Mr. Gompers on the question of commanding the union labor men to vote for Bryan. President Lewis, in a circular to members of his union, says: "The United Mine Workers did not elect me international president to influence your political preference or to tell you how you should cast your vote on election day. From what I know of our members you are fully competent to take care of yourselves and you will vote on election day."

War Veterans And Pension Legislation.
