Humane Agent John F. Sheridan Acting in Spirit of Dumb Animals.

Some owners of horses are careless enough to leave them standing exposed to the fierce wintry blasts for hours without any other protection than that furnished by nature. Humane consideration demands different treatment than that for the horse, man's very faithful servant, and it is the purpose of Humane Agent Sheridan to see to it that during the severe weather at least horses left hitched in the business section hereabouts, or in any other place that come under his observation must be properly blanketed and protected against the rigors of winter.

NIGHT TELEPHONE

BRADDEEGE WINS

WAS CHOSEN UNITED STATES SENATOR BY CONNECTICUT LEGISLATURE AT HARTFORD TUESDAY.

Was by Fifteen Votes in Spirited Contest—It Was Not Fought—Senator Morgan G. Bulkeley Came On From Washington to Assist His Colleagues in Struggle for Political Life.

The joint caucuses of the Republicans was held in Representatives Hall at the Capitol Tuesday afternoon and Senator Frank B. Braddege of New London was re-elected, the vote standing 130 for Braddege to 111 for Congressman E. J. Hill of South Norwalk.

By mutual agreement no nominating speeches were made. Every Republican whose name appeared on the caucus list voted. Chairman Michael Kennedy of the Republican State Committee called the caucus to order at 2:10 o'clock and asked the caucus to nominate a chairman.
