WATKINS WON

REMNINATION IN JOINT REPUBLICAN CAUCUS FOR COUNTY COMMISSIONER

Officials of Caucus Opposed to Roll Call Vote by Majority of More Than Two to One—Will Balance Contest—Best Deal for Success Time is Quest of This Office—Congratulations Gathers.

F. Ernest Watkins of South Manchester will succeed himself as county commissioner for this county as the result of the caucus of Hartford county republican senators and representatives held in room 20 at the capital at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon.

Mr. Watkins was authorized by the caucus to present a resolution to the House setting forth the fact that F. Ernest Watkins of South Manchester was the choice of the caucus as candidate for County Commissioner for Hartford county, for a term of four years beginning October 1, 1909.

Mr. Watkins is serving out an unexpired term of three years as county commissioner, succeeding Edward W. Dewey of Granby who was elected sheriff of Hartford county, Mr. Watkins defeated Mr. Bent for the office of County Commissioner two years ago.

It required loyal, thoughtful, careful and energetic work on the part of Mr. Watkins' direct supporters to ensure the nomination of Mr. Watkins. The contest was keenly waged and fairly well balanced.

Mr. Watkins is receiving the hearty congratulations of his many friends here and elsewhere upon the successful issue. It was clearly apparent that two thirds of the officials comprising the caucus were opposed to being placed upon record by a roll call vote.

GYMNASTIC EXHIBITION

LARGE AND ENTHUSIASTIC GATHERING ASSEMBLED AND SEE DEMONSTRATION OF TRAINING

Pretty Evolutionists Well Executed Under Direction of Miss Nellie B. Walters, Gynecologic Teacher—Exciting and Interesting Work Exhibited.

The gymnastic exhibition given in High School Hall last Wednesday evening by the Ninth District School children under the direction of Miss Nellie B. Walters, the gynecologic teacher, attracted a large gathering of people and proved a fine success in every particular.

The children who took part in this were from the fifth grade up to the High School and were from ten to fifteen years old. No child was more than one year.

The girls wore white dresses with black stockings and gymnastic shoes, and the boys wore white shirts, dark trousers and gymnastic shoes.

The first number on the program was a dumb bell drill by children of the fifth grade. There were about thirty of these children and a fine show of their work.

The second number on the program was the boys' practice. In this about sixteen boys from the grammar grades took part. They were about eleven and twelve years of age.

GIRL MISSING

MISS MARY W. BENNETT OF WEST CENTER STREET LEAVES HOME SECRETLY

Teak Trolley Car to Hartford Tuesday Afternoon and Has Not Been Seen Nor Heard of Her Since—Didn't Bring Any Extra Clothing On Her Travels—Had Five Dollars.

Miss Mary Bennett, daughter of James and Mrs. Bennett of 61 West Center street has been missing from her home since last Tuesday afternoon. Her parents and friends are making every effort to locate her but up to this writing, in so far as known here, their efforts have been unsuccessful.

Miss Bennett is about twenty-one years old, is five feet three inches tall, has luscious black hair, medium dark complexion, is plump and pretty. When last seen she was wearing a dark skirt and coat which she wore to the mill, as she was employed in the weaving department of Cheney Brothers silk mills here.

Miss Bennett had continued her work up to two o'clock in the afternoon, when she complained of having tummyache and asked permission to go home which was granted. She told her mother she had to go to the dentist's to have her teeth treated and went up stairs and put on a clean shirt waist. Her mother gave her a five-dollar bill to pay the dentist and also to make some purchases for the house. Instead of going to the dentist's she took a trolley car for Hartford, and Conductor John Storeham changed the five-dollar bill for her in order that she might pay her car fare.

The girl's absence has been reported to the police of this place and also to the Hartford police authorities. Detective Sergeant John M. Henry was detailed by Chief Tramm to take up the case and report yesterday afternoon, here searching for clues, without results. Her parents are at a loss to know why she should leave her home in that manner as she took no clothing with her other than that she wore.

FIFTY YEARS MARRIED. SOUTH W. E. CHURCH NOTES.

At the quarterly meeting of the South Methodist church held Wednesday evening the 23 persons present voted unanimously to recommend to the coming General Conference that Rev. W. F. Davis be returned as the pastor here for the coming year.

Rev. W. F. Davis is just completing his sixth year as pastor of the South Methodist church.

It was also voted that rubber matting be placed upon the aisles of the church forthwith.

Rev. W. F. Davis has organized a class in physical culture among the young men of the church comprising 25 members and has just ordered two dozen each of dumb bells, Indian clubs and wands for their use.

Harold C. Davis of Hartford is to be the physical instructor. The class in physical culture will meet once a week under the direction of Mr. Davis of Hartford.

A new communion service has been prepared for the South Methodist Church and was used there for the first time last Sunday. It consists of five polished aluminum trays containing forty small white cups all enclosed in a suitable case.

The class in physical culture is being shaped so as to be readily employed in athletic sports. This is a most modern and largely equipped and is introduced largely in the present efforts that are being made to stamp out tuberculosis.

A filler is also supplied with the equipment which fills eight cups at once. The old fashioned filler charged but one cup at a time.

kin wanted the town to assume the responsibility for collection of the liens. Selectman Watkins was instructed to take the matter up, determining legal status of the case, and look after the town's interests.

WANTED NAME CHANGED. M. J. Maguire petitioned the board of selectmen to change the name of Autumn street to some other that would not conflict with Adams street and suggested that the name "Downing" be substituted, or else the name "Wheat" street. Mr. Maguire held that he found many instances where letters had been misdirected and persons had been misled in locating people residing on Autumn street.

The board of selectmen did not think that there is sufficient similarity between the names to cause any great trouble warranting a change. They held that the names of "Stanger" and "Summer" street, "Gardner" and "Garden" street were much more likely to lead to confusion and require changes than Autumn or Adams street.
