RAPID TRANSIT

TO BE INTRODUCED BETWEEN SOUTH MANCHESTER AND HARTFORD BY CONNECTICUT COMPANY

Petition to Selectmen for Permission to Lay Switches will be presented at Meeting Next Monday Afternoon—Plans for Same Now Ready—Through Express Cars will Make Trip in Forty Minutes.

Persons heretofore will be very much interested in the announcement made herewith that the Connecticut Company is planning to furnish rapid transit during the congested hours of travel between South Manchester and Hartford by placing of two switches, one at the Love Lane junction and one at the Woodland schoolhouse. By placing of these new switches annoying delays will be avoided and the running time to Hartford will be made in forty minutes.

The Connecticut Company have prepared their plans for these switches and will present a petition to the selectmen of the Town of Manchester at their meeting next Monday asking permission to lay the switches in accordance with their plans. At the Love Lane junction it is planned to make a Y so that cars on the Rockville line at that point will not be interfered with by changing of the schedule on the South Manchester line.

Under the proposed new schedule the cars leaving South Manchester for Hartford beginning at 6 a. m. and continuing at half hourly intervals until 7.45 a. m. will be through express cars making no stops between South Manchester and Hartford. Express cars will leave Hartford at the same hours for South Manchester making no stops between Hartford and South Manchester. This will accommodate commuters who go from this place to Hartford daily to their work and also those who come from Hartford to South Manchester to work in the mills here of which there are a goodly number at the present time.

In the afternoon express cars will leave Hartford beginning at 4.45 and including 6.45 at the half hourly intervals for South Manchester, and cars will leave South Manchester at the same hours and intervals for Hartford, no stops being made in either direction between South Manchester and Hartford. This afternoon schedule will accommodate the shoppers very much and will be highly appreciated.

If the selectmen grant the necessary permission at their meeting next Monday, which they undoubtedly will, the switches indicated above will be laid at once and the express service started on its merry mission.

These concessions for rapid transit have been granted through the instrumentality of Representatives Harry M. Burke and Aaron Johnson, who are bending every effort in the direction of securing improved trolley service for the public of this place.

It may be proper to mention in this relation that Messrs. Burke and Johnson are doing all they can meanwhile to secure the passage of their bill through the legislature requiring a ten-cent fare between this place and Hartford. It is not their purpose to relax their efforts in this direction one iota. They have set out to secure a ten-cent fare between these two points and if it is possible at this time it will be done.

This is in accordance with the wishes of the general public, and will be hailed with great delight when it becomes an accomplished fact, which soon or late it will be. The request is based on right and reasonable grounds and should be granted.

UNANIMOUS REPORT

OF JUDICIARY COMMITTEE MADE TO HOUSE YESTERDAY FAVORING APPOINTMENT OF MR. ARNOTT

As Judge of Town Court of Manchester—Backed By Both Representatives and the Senator From This District—Formidable and Invaluable Support—Looks Like a Winner.

The report of the Judiciary Committee to the House yesterday was unanimously in favor of appointing Alexander Arnott as judge of the Town Court of Manchester for two years, beginning on the first Monday of July, 1909.

This matter has interested citizens of the town generally and has been the subject of much discussion and speculation for several weeks past. Petitions favoring the appointment of Mr. Arnott and also of Mr. Bowers have been drawn up and received about 500 signatures each. They have been presented to the Judiciary Committee. A hearing on the question was held last week, and arguments were made favoring both candidates before the Judiciary Committee. After weighing all the arguments presented the Judiciary Committee have reported unanimously in favor of the appointment of Mr. Arnott.

BRING BACKING FOR ARNOTT

Both of our representatives, Messrs. Burke and Johnson, and the senator from this district, E. Hart Fenn, are heartily in favor of the appointment of Mr. Arnott as judge of the town court of Manchester.

Given such formidable support as this, namely, the unanimous choice of the Judiciary Committee, and the hearty, cordial and enthusiastic backing of our two representatives and of our state senator, we see no good reason for any apprehension as to the outcome of this matter when it comes before the House and Senate for action in the regular course of procedure.

HOW JUDICIARY COMMITTEE FEEL

As an index to the hearty approval of the Judiciary Committee for the appointment of Mr. Arnott as judge of the town court of Manchester, when Chairman Barnes of the Judiciary Committee presented the report in the House yesterday afternoon, he asked that the roll be announced and the report put upon its passage.

REPRESENTATIVE HALL OBJECTS

Objection to this course was made by Representative Hall of Willington, who asked that the resolution be allowed to take the regular course, without suspension of the rules, but that instead it be tabled for the calendar and printing. Mr. Hall said that he intended to speak against the passage of the resolution appointing Mr. Arnott, but that he was not prepared to do so at that time.

CHAIRMAN BARNES GENEROUS

Chairman Barnes of the Judiciary Committee replied saying that his motion was made simply because such action had been taken in other cases and there was no particular wish to rush the matter through, he was willing that Mr. Hall be heard and he thereupon withdrew his motion asking for the suspension of the rules. The report was tabled for calendar and printing. This carries it over to next week, as the House will not reassemble before next Tuesday at 12.30.

LOOKS GOOD FOR ARNOTT

The outlook for Mr. Arnott certainly looks mighty good to us. The undivided support of the Judiciary Committee is a tower of strength that seems invulnerable. We do not anticipate for a moment any reversal of their decision.

ARE ABUNDANTLY SUPPORTED HERE

Besides the backing indicated above Mr. Arnott's candidacy for appointment as judge of the town court of Manchester has the loyal support of a large body of voters in this town. We firmly believe that if the matter was put to a popular vote in this place that Mr. Arnott would win out handsomely. It is our candid opinion that a majority of the rank and file of the voters of the town of Manchester favor Mr. Arnott's appointment as judge of the town court, and confidently and unflinchingly look forward to have the State legislature carry out their wishes in this matter. We do not doubt for one moment that this will be the final result.

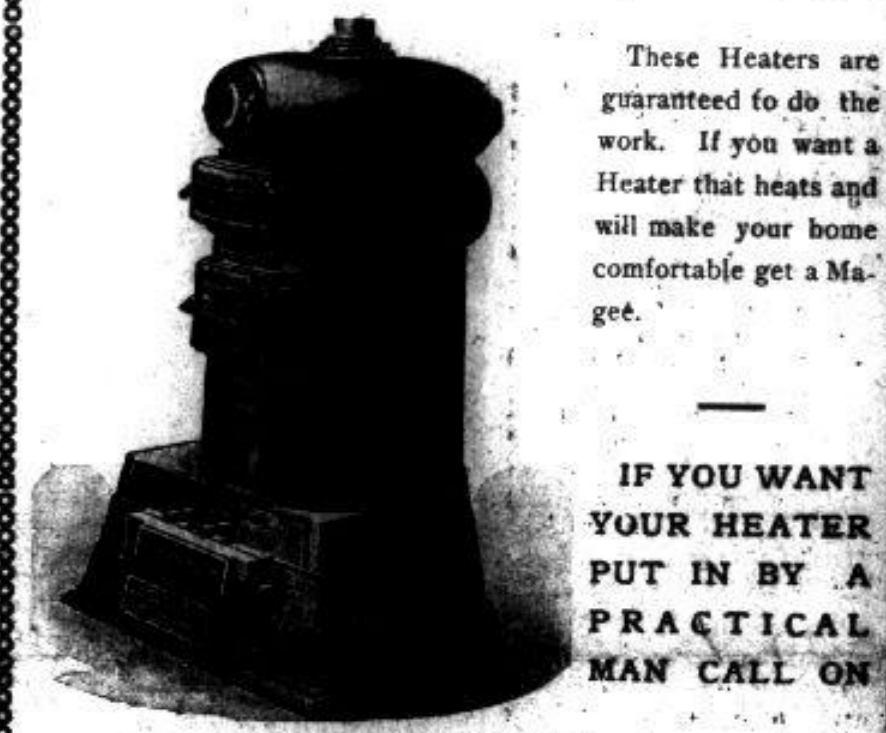
