HOUSE FOR ARNOTT

ACTION TAKEN BY LEGISLATURE ON ST. PATRICK'S DAY, ONE HUNDRED TWELVE TO ONE HUNDRED SIXTYE INCREASED POWERS

Several Arguments by Members for One Hour for Arnott and Bowers on Judgment of Town Court of Manchester—Licensing Report of Judiciary Committee—Said, House Refuses to Reconsider.

The unanimous report of the Judiciary committee in favor of appointing Alexander Arnott as judge of the town court of Manchester came before the House Wednesday, St. Patrick's Day, and was discussed for one hour. The previous question was ordered and the vote taken, viva voce. The chair declared that the eyes had it. This was doubted and a rising vote was called for, for which Speaker Burke named tellers who reported as follows:

Whole number voting, 218. Necessary to a choice, 110. For Mr. Arnott 112. For Herbert O. Bowers 106.

The chair announced that the unanimous report of the Judiciary committee had been accepted and that Mr. Arnott was the choice of the House for judge of the town court of Manchester.

RECORDED TO RECONSIDER Charles H. Burnes, chairman of the Judiciary committee, addressing the Speaker of the House stated that it would not be possible for him to be in the House the next day, and therefore he moved that the vote just taken be reconsidered and that the matter be postponed until the next day.

Mr. Burnes' motion was put by the chair and was promptly voted down, thus clinching the incident so far as the House was concerned at this stage of the proceedings.

CHAIRMAN BURNES House Joint Resolution No. 131, resolutions appointing Alexander Arnott Judge of the town court of Manchester was read for the second time in the House at 12 o'clock last Wednesday. Chairman Burnes of the Judiciary committee took the floor. He explained that the Judiciary committee had reported unanimously in favor of Mr. Arnott, and stated the reasons why the committee had arrived at this decision, most of which are known to our readers at this time. In brief it was to the effect that of the largest assembly, meetings of this session of the General Assembly in which the committee had to limit the number of speakers to be heard, in so far as the committee was able to judge from the hearing the people of Manchester were equally divided between a choice of Mr. Arnott or Mr. Bowers. Petitions for each side having approximately 500 names being presented.

Mr. Burnes recalled that Mr. Arnott is a graduate of Trinity College, a graduate of Yale Law School, a practicing lawyer both in Hartford and Manchester, and that no one has claimed that he is not fully capable of managing the affairs of the court of the town of Manchester properly. Finding the entire merit of the town practically equally divided the Judiciary committee naturally referred to the two representatives from Manchester and to the senator from that district, and these gentlemen had all urged most strongly that Mr. Arnott be appointed as judge under the circumstances the Judiciary committee believed it to be their duty to unanimously report in favor of Mr. Arnott's appointment.

Representative Carter of Seymour argued in favor of Mr. Bowers, claiming that 75 per cent of the people of the town of Manchester wished to have Mr. Bowers reappointed.

MR. HALL OF WILLINGTON Representative Hall of Willington took the floor in behalf of the appointment of Mr. Bowers and said that in his opinion the Judiciary committee had made a mistake in reporting in favor of Mr. Arnott. He said for the past two weeks he had been studying this case on the original ground, namely in Manchester, that he had made personal investigations, but that he favored the continuance of Mr. Bowers as judge of the town court of Manchester.

He alluded to the petitions that had been presented in favor of Mr. Arnott, as he had heard there were names on that number of men who were voters. Mr. Burke refused to give it to him.

Mr. Burke at this juncture endeavored to explain that point to the House but Mr. Hall refused to permit him.

Mr. Hall said that the petition of Mr. Bowers represented 50 per cent of the taxpayers of the town of Manchester and practically all of the manufacturers in the town. He had called personally upon business men both at North Manchester and South Manchester and all were enthusiastically in favor of Mr. Bowers. Thus with the business men,

that is contrary to Section Two of this act, it shall not apply to the town of Manchester. The motion was carried and Section Two adopted as amended.

Section Three, pertaining to giving the selectmen control of sidewalks, and Section Two adopted as amended.
