### DIGNITY OF OWNERSHIP.

The Feeling of Pride That is Born of Paying Taxes.

"Many a time," said a policeman in the southern part of the city, "when arresting men, especially intoxicated men, I have been told by my prisoner that he was a taxpayer and that he helped pay my wages."

"I always regarded this sort of back talk as merely drunken insolence and never paid much attention to it until about a year ago, when I bought a house and lot and became myself a taxpayer. I had always rented before and never gave a thought to taxes, but as soon as I moved into my own house I began to appreciate the feelings of men who resented arrest because they paid taxes."

"There is certainly a considerable addition to the dignity of the man who helps support the government. He feels a degree of responsibility that a renter or roomer never understands, and my idea is that every man in the country ought to become a taxpayer as soon as he can. And the more that he does help support the government and bears his share of the expense makes him a better citizen. Habitual criminals are rarely taxpayers. They know they may have to run any day and perhaps never come back, so they do not say real estate, rent rooms and lodgers all their lives."—St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

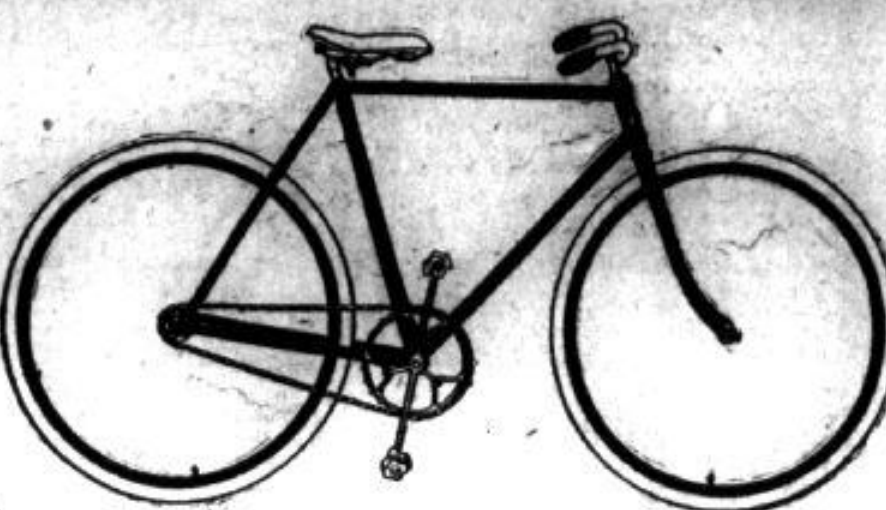

NO BASE BALL

NEGOTIATIONS FOR RESUMPTION OF BASE BALL RELATIONS WITH ROCKVILLE ASSOCIATION KILLED

Manchester Base Ball Corporation being Out of Business Permanently and Offering Their Property For Sale—Lease of Grounds Will Not Be Renewed—Rockville Refused to Play.

THE adjourned annual meeting of the Manchester Baseball Corporation was held Monday evening at the office of E. O. Bowers. In view of the recent action taken by the Rockville Baseball Association in reference to the probability of resuming baseball negotiations with Manchester, the Manchester Baseball Corporation voted to not undertake to put a ball team in the field this year. They also voted to dispose of their property at Baseball Park as best they could and to not renew their lease of the grounds.

The gentlemen who own the land known as Baseball Park have kindly consented to give the Manchester Baseball Corporation thirty days from the 1st of April, which is the date of the expiration of their lease, in order to dispose of their grandstand, bleachers, ticket offices, refreshment booth, fence, etc.

It was earnestly hoped that negotiations might be resumed with Rockville and the board of directors here were perfectly willing to withdraw and leave the management of baseball during the coming year in the hands of an entirely new board, but inasmuch as the Rockville Baseball Association have made this impossible there was no other course open for the directors of the Manchester Baseball Corporation than to go out of business.

It is freely admitted here that unless Rockville and Manchester enter into competition in the baseball game, there is no use of undertaking to carry on a successful season of baseball of the grade that the public have been accustomed to in these communities of late years. 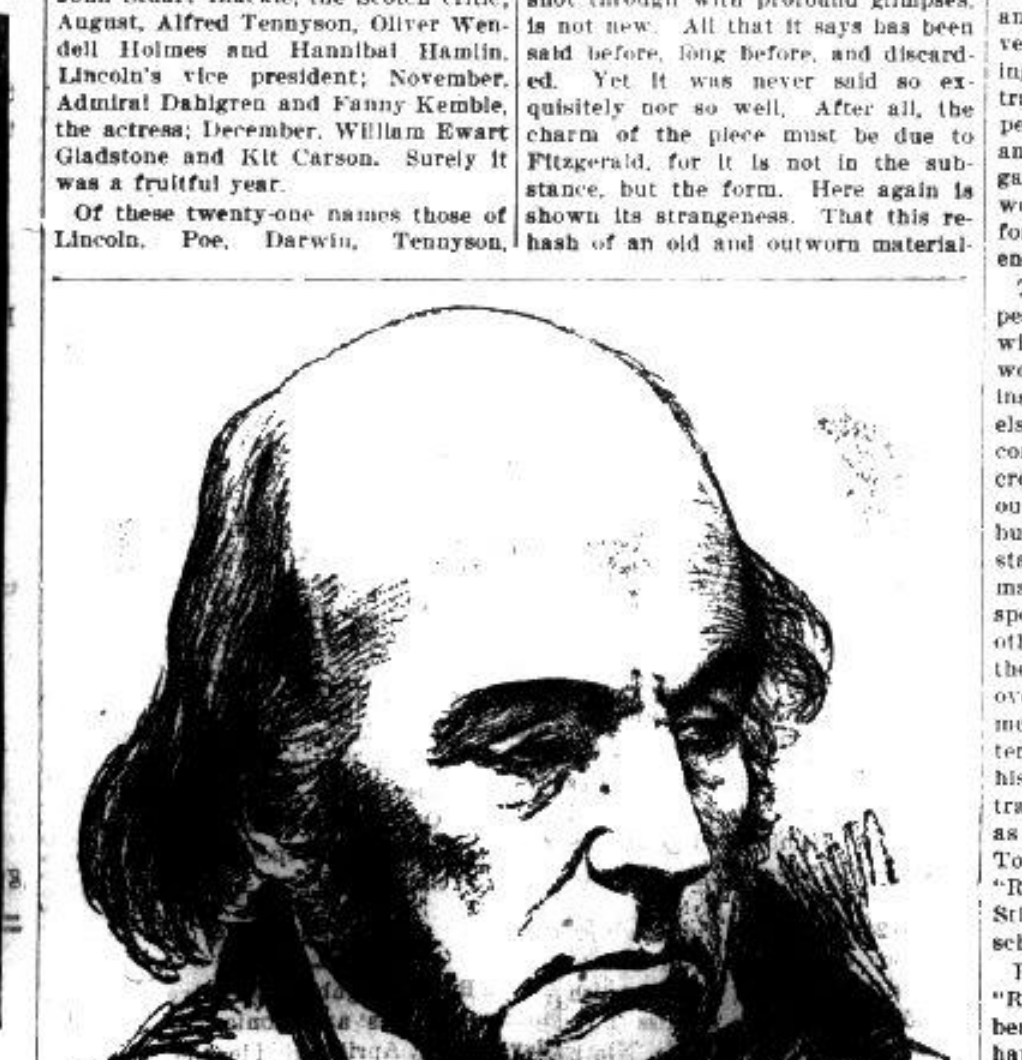

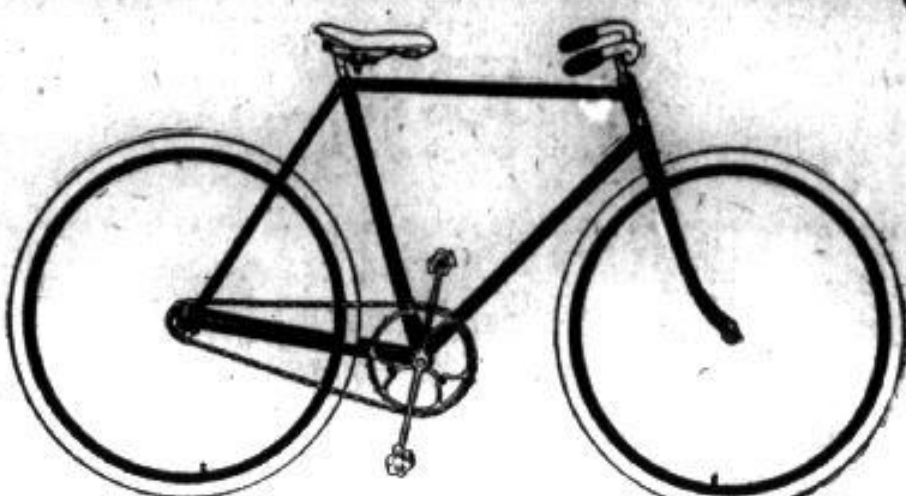

## TEN-CENT TROLLEY FARE

HEARING SET BY COMMITTEE ON RAILROADS FOR WEDNESDAY APRIL TWENTY-FIRST AT CAPITOL

United Effort of All Persons Interested Here Required To Secure Passage of This Important Measure—It Is A Case of Greatest Good To Greatest Number—C. G. D. Call Is Issued—Let All Respond.

Notice is hereby given that the Committee on Railroads will give a hearing at the capital in Hartford Wednesday, April 21, upon the petition presented by the Manchester representatives asking for a ten-cent trolley fare between Manchester and Hartford. It is earnestly hoped that interested persons will make an effort to present themselves at this hearing in as goodly numbers as possible in order to demonstrate to the Committee on Railroads that there is a real desire on the part of the people of the town of Manchester for a ten-cent fare between this place and Hartford.

There is no question at all as to the desire of the masses of the people here for this legislation. They are seeking more rapid and less expensive trolley communication with the capital and are very deeply interested in the outcome of this measure. The rank and file of the people here are in favor of everything possible will be done to bring about this desirable result. Numerous signatures have been presented to the legislature expressing the desire of the people of Manchester for a ten-cent trolley fare.

Representatives Harry M. Burke and Aaron Johnson and Senator E. Hart are doing all they possibly can to secure for the people of Manchester this desired and greatly desired reduction of trolley fare, and our representatives are earnestly and confidently looking forward to the cooperation of everybody here in order to secure for their constituents the best and most desirable legislation to bring this about.

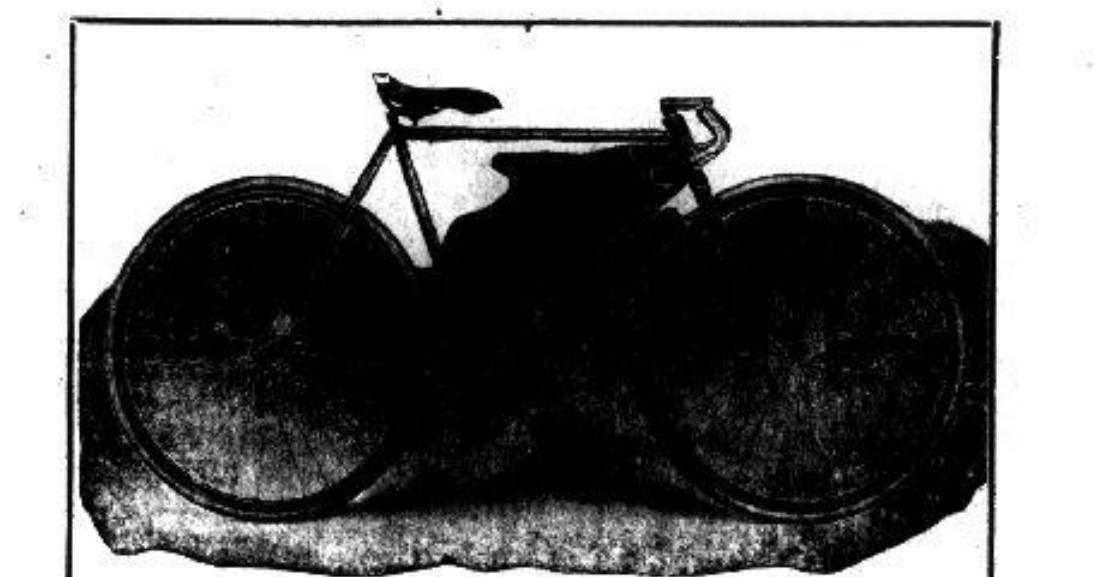
