SELECTMEN MEET

MAYE SESSION LASTING WELL INTO MIDDNIGHT. MANY MEASURES DISCUSSED AT LENGTH

Town To Build Adams Street Bridge—May with Willard Street Bridge—Meadow May Not Be Laid Out—Charter Oak Street—About Settling Curbs and Building Sidewalks. Bills Paid.

The regular monthly meeting of the board of selectmen took place at the hall of Records Monday evening with all the selectmen in attendance but George H. Allen. As the selectmen's room was occupied by Tax Collector Pitkin and a corps of soldiers, the meeting of the board of selectmen was held in the probate office across the hall from the selectmen's room.

Chairman Horace B. Cheney presided and Secretary John M. Williams reported on the proceedings. The meeting lasted until 11:45. The one feature which occupied more time than any other was the signing of the may bills. Last had accrued during the month and which, according to the present practice, all the selectmen present are required to sign, and which of necessity demand the signatures of a majority of the board before the bills can be paid.

PETITIONS FROM EIGHT SCHOOL DISTRICTS

Petitions were received from the committee of the eight school districts of the town asking the board to make some provision whereby the salary of teachers might be given them before leaving town for their vacations and generally to have their salaries paid at the first of the month. The claim of petitioners was that the teachers needed the money to pay their board and other bills and also to make necessary purchases when they went away on their vacations. It was urged that business in town generally pay once a week and they thought that some arrangement might be made to facilitate the getting of salaries by teachers. The matter was discussed very generally and the statement made that the regular meeting of the board of selectmen had been changed from the second Monday in each month to the first Monday in order to accommodate the teachers, but that the board could not be shifting about from one day to another in this manner for any such consideration. It was felt that there should be some permanent arrangement of their method of transacting business and consequently the board refused to make any change in recognition of the school teachers.

GET IN BILLS EARLIER

Town Clerk Sanford M. Benton complained of the way in which bills came in at the "eleventh hour" thus hampering him in his work and not giving him time enough to arrange them in suitable order for the signing by the selectmen and to make the necessary town orders for the payment of such bills. It was explained that persons having bills against the town should send them to Mr. Benton hereafter rather than to Secretary John M. Williams, as the work of preparing them for the signatures of the selectmen devolves upon Town Clerk Benton and not upon Secretary Williams.

REFERRED TO MAKE SPECIAL PLAN FOR TEACHERS

Some of the selectmen were of the opinion that a special arrangement should be made with reference to the payment of teachers going on their vacations but the majority of the board were not willing to accede to any such demand. Chairman Cheney explained that before the bills for teachers salaries could be paid the board of selectmen had to be furnished with a certificate from the respective school committee setting forth the amounts due each teacher and showing the actual time for which the teacher was entitled to compensation. It was explained that the town employees generally got their pay once a month and that it was not deemed necessary to make any special arrangements with reference to teachers, as the town operatives had certain bills to pay as well as the teachers and all could make their plans accordingly. It was believed that no hardship would be worked in this way as the payments came regularly once a month anyway and the conditions could be adapted to meet this requirement.

NOTE OF LAWSUITS GIVEN.

Chairman Cheney called the attention of the board to the fact that official notice had been served upon the board of the penalty of four lawsuits against the town. Although this country has been called a wasteful country and this age, the age of waste, still if we stop to consider all of our manufacturing processes, we find that in a majority of them the material used is the by-product of other similar concerns which utilize the raw product. 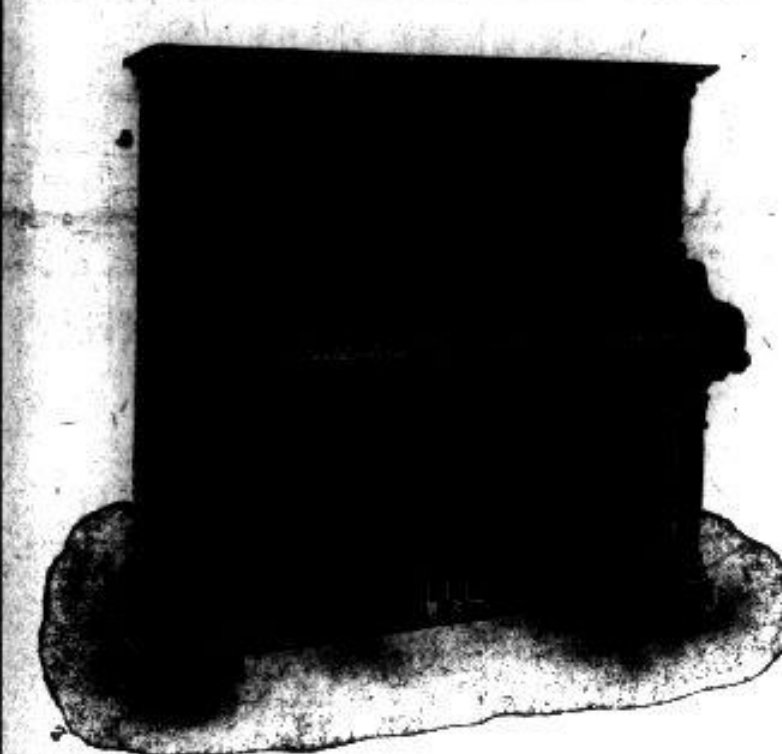
