Fishing School For Belgian Boys

Most boys and many girls take naturally to fishing. Belgium, however, is the first country to teach fishing as a scientific industry.

About twenty years ago it was noticed that the Belgian fisheries were not so valuable as they had been. A wise man, Abbe Pype, said it was because the coast dwellers no longer knew how to fish properly.

The first lesson is about the make and sails of a fishing boat. A small model of such a boat is placed before them, and the bright little fellows learn the names of every part of it in less than no time.

One of the series of lessons these enthusiastic boys like best of all is that in which they learn what the bottom of the sea is like. Soundings have been taken so often and so thoroughly in the North Sea that now it is known just about what the bottom of the ocean there is like.

In every kind of tide and wind the pupils must know how to manage a fishing boat. They must reckon latitude and longitude and take readings on their coast.



The course of instruction lasts three years and there are the happiest of them in the boys' lives. When they are advanced pupils they go out for actual fishing trips and sometimes are sent on the sea for days. So soon as they are graduated they are snapped up at once by fishing companies that want the best services to be had.

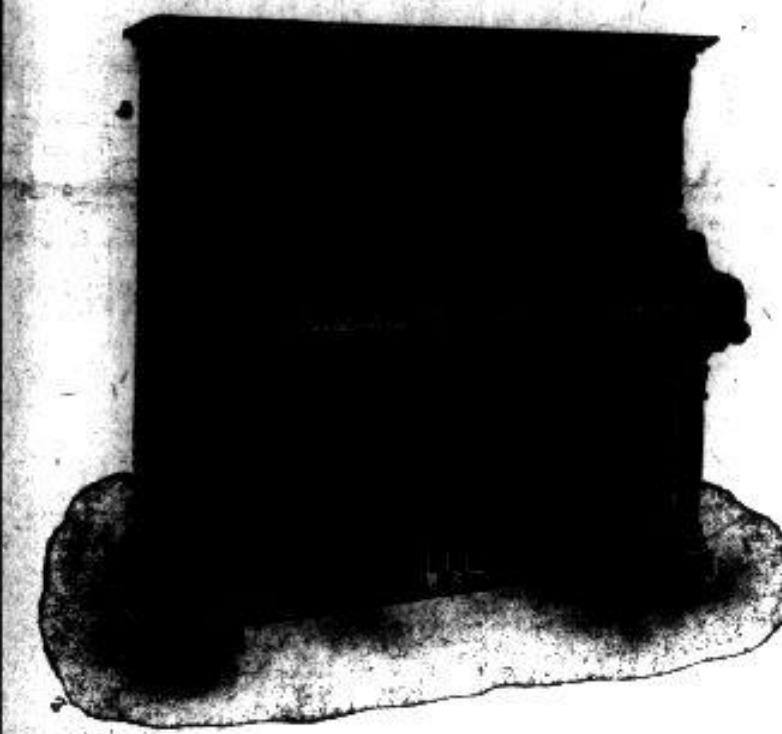

TEN-CENT FARE

Legislature Refuses To Create Office of Commissioner of Public Records. The Judiciary Committee unanimously reported unfavorably upon the Senate bill creating the office of Commissioner of Public Records last Wednesday. The Senate accepted the report of the Judiciary committee and the resolution was rejected. The bill was transmitted to the House on Thursday and the House concurred with the Senate in rejecting the bill.

STATE OF CONNECTICUT GENERAL ASSEMBLY

JANUARY SESSION A. D. 1909. An Act Regulating Trolley Fares Between Manchester and the City of Hartford. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened.

SECTION 1. The fare for the transportation of passengers upon the trolley lines of the Connecticut Company running either from the town line in that part of the town of Manchester known as Oakland, or from Manchester Green or from the terminus of the trolley line of said Connecticut Company in South Manchester, in the town of Manchester, to the city of Hartford, in either direction, shall not exceed ten cents.

SECTION 2. No person shall be required to pay a fare greater than five cents for transportation upon the trolley cars of the Connecticut Company, anywhere within the limits of the town of Manchester.

SECTION 3. Transfers shall be allowed to passengers, upon request, at all transfer points along the lines of the Connecticut Company the town of Manchester, at the terminus of the line of said Connecticut Company at City Hall in the City of Hartford, and at all transfer points along the lines of said Connecticut Company between the town of Manchester and the city of Hartford, without any charge being made therefor.

SECTION 4. No person shall be required to pay a fare greater than five cents for passage upon the trolley cars of the Connecticut Company running from any of the points mentioned in Paragraph One to Laurel Park in the town of Manchester, in either direction; nor shall any person be required to pay a fare greater than five cents for passage upon the trolley cars of said Connecticut Company running from said Laurel Park to the City of Hartford in either direction.

SECTION 5. This act shall take effect from its passage.

DEATH OF GOV. LILLEY

LIFE ENDED GENTLY, AWARE AS SHADES OF EVENING ADVANCED LAST WEDNESDAY AT HARTFORD HOME.

Entire State in Mourning—Body Lying in State at Capitol Today—Funeral Services Tomorrow Morning at Capitol—Burial at Waterbury—State Militia Will Attend—Sketch of His Life

Governor George L. Lilley died at the Executive Mansion on Farmington Avenue at Hartford Wednesday evening at 7:30 o'clock. The end was calm and peaceful and he entered into eternity without making a struggle at the severance of the spirit from the mortal remains. He had been in a state of coma for several days prior to the close of his earthly career. The physicians noted the moribund and technical cause of death as "Toxemia, the result of acute nephritis, with uremia and cerebral hyperoxygenation." Prayers were said at the residence at 10:30 o'clock this forenoon and at 11 o'clock the body was taken to the rotunda at the Capitol where it will lie in state until ten o'clock this evening.

LIFE ENDED GENTLY, AWARE AS SHADES OF EVENING ADVANCED LAST WEDNESDAY AT HARTFORD HOME.
