Copy of Substitute Bill To Be Presented To Railroad Committee of Hearing on Same Which is Scheduled for Next Week Wednesday—Broadens Original Measure—Makes Public Roads Clear.

STATE OF CONNECTICUT GENERAL ASSEMBLY JANUARY SESSION A. D. 1909. AN ACT REGULATING TROLLEY FARES Between Manchester and the City of Hartford.

SECTION 1. The fare for the transportation of passengers upon the trolley lines of the Connecticut Company running either from the town line in that part of the town of Manchester known as Oakland, or from Manchester Green or from the terminus of the trolley line of said Connecticut Company in South Manchester, in the town of Manchester, in the city of Hartford, in either direction, shall not exceed ten cents.

SECTION 2. No person shall be required to pay a fare greater than five cents for transportation upon the trolley cars of the Connecticut Company, anywhere within the limits of the town of Manchester.

SECTION 3. Transfers shall be limited to passengers, upon request, at all transfer points along the lines of the Connecticut Company the town of Manchester, at the terminus of the line of said Connecticut Company at City Hall in the City of Hartford, and at all transfer points along the lines of said Connecticut Company between the town of Manchester and the city of Hartford, without any charge being made therefor.

SECTION 4. No person shall be required to pay a fare greater than five cents for passage upon the trolley cars of the Connecticut Company running from any of the points mentioned in Paragraph One to Laurel Park in the town of Manchester, in either direction; nor shall any person be required to pay a fare greater than five cents for passage upon the trolley cars of said Connecticut Company running from said Laurel Park to the City of Hartford in either direction.

SECTION 5. This act shall take effect from its passage.

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DEATH OF GOV. LILLEY

LIFE ENDED GENTLY, AFTER AS SHADEN OF EVENING ADVANCED LAST WEDNESDAY AT HARTFORD HOME.

Entire State in Mourning—Body Lying in State at Capitol Today—Funeral Services Tomorrow Morning at Capitol—Burial at Waterbury—State Militia Will Attend—Sketch of His Life.

Governor George L. Lilley died at the Executive Mansion on Farmington Avenue at Hartford Wednesday evening at 7:30 o'clock. The end was calm and peaceful and he entered into eternity without making a struggle at the severance of the spirit from the mortal remains. He had been in a state of coma for several days prior to the close of his earthly career.

Representative Burke is in charge of the hearing for the Manchester end and handled the matter in a desirable manner. It was a strenuous session lasting from 2 until 6 o'clock without one moment's intermission and the proceedings did not lag at any stage.

SELECTMEN MEET

GRANT PERMISSION TO CONNECTICUT COMPANY FOR LOVE LANE TURNOUT

Oak Hall Building Company to have Collars under Main Street Sidewalk at Proposed New Street—De House representing the Oak Hall Building Company for the establishment of curb lines on Main street, corner of Oak street, and another petition from Mr. House asking permission to build a cellar under the sidewalk of the proposed new building on Main street, same to be used for coal bunkers and a vault, also on the matter of relocating the existing tank and cesspool at the Center.

TRUNKS PETITION

Manager Bristol in presenting the petition for the Connecticut Company said that there would be no change in the location of the present tank, but that the proposed turnout would extend 250 feet west of the telephone booth at Love Lane. He informed the board that the Connecticut Company intended to build a new bridge over the Hockanum river at Hillsideville, but not within the present year and for that reason they would not care to change the grade of the track any further than the bridge.

BOUNDS OF HIGHWAY

The question of where are the bounds of the highway at the point of the proposed Love Lane turnout was discussed very fully. John Jeffrey objected to having the turnout placed within the boundaries of his property at that point. It was finally agreed to permit the Connecticut Company to locate their turnout at Love Lane in accordance with the drawings which they presented recently to the board of selectmen. They are limited, however, to confine themselves within the highway and a condition is placed upon the grant, that the Connecticut Company is to upgrade the track to conform with the grade of the highway from Love Lane to the bridge over the Hockanum river.

CURB LINE ON MAIN STREET

C. E. House appearing for the Oak Hall Building Company asked to have the curb lines established at the corner of Main and Oak streets in order that they might go ahead with their proposed new building as soon as the wreck in the recent fire could be removed and other necessary arrangements made for construction.

CELLARS UNDER SIDEWALKS

C. E. House representing the Oak Hall Building Company presented a petition asking permission to build a cellar beneath the sidewalk on Main street fronting the proposed new building. The cellar to be used for coal bunkers and a vault, and same to be constructed with the approval of the Superintendent of Roads. Mr. House in explaining his petition said that they had consulted legal authority with reference to their right to build a cellar under the sidewalk and were informed that their ownership of the land extended to the center of the highway. Mr. House explained that the Oak Hall Building Company, however, wished to have the permission of the selectmen before going on with the work.

CHAIRMAN CHENEY QUESTIONED

Chairman Cheney questioned the authority of the attorney giving the information to Mr. House and said this was an important matter, was a question that was eliciting the attention of the selectmen. They were willing to grant the petition with the provision that the cellars had already been built under the sidewalks on Main street and cited the Bank building as one instance and the Parcel building which is occupied by the Keith & Post Company and by the F. T. Bish Hardware Company as another.

RELOCATING WATERING TANK

Because of the laying of the turnout for the Manchester Green trolley car at the Center it became necessary to have the watering tank at that point moved. The Connecticut Company appeared before the board of selectmen asking permission to relocate the tank. They agreed to pay the expense of moving the tank and of laying necessary drainage tile for the tank from its proposed new location to the gutter east of the track. The petition of the company was granted with the understanding that the location of the tank be left with the Road Superintendent. Ulrich and Division Superintendent Nettleton.

GRANTED BY THE BOARD TO HAVE SIGNED

The majority of the selectmen favored granting the petition of Messrs. House and Hale with reference to building a cellar under the sidewalk, but they did not like to establish a precedent. Another novelty of the occasion will be the fact that Edward F. Taylor, car and wagon painter, will sing all the waltzes played during the evening. It is the purpose of the committee to provide for their waltzes the music of popular up-to-date ballads that are well known and liked at all times and places who will not doubt be present in large numbers. This plan of singing the waltzes is quite the vogue in New York at the present time. George E. Hunt, one of the energetic members of the fire department has introduced the idea here and it is likely to prove very popular.

DO NOT WANT CHANGE

The Glassbury Kaiting Company are opposed to changing the layout of the highway at the terminus of the trolley in Manchester Green, as had been proposed by the Manchester Green Improvement Society. They claim the shifting of the road in a northerly direction as proposed would compel them to move their fire hydrants close to their mill, which they deemed might be a decided detriment in case of fire.
