TENNYSON'S CENTENARY

standards of wealth, his riches having been of the internal and real variety. He was nothing of the dilettante, but a very robust man, breezy, given to much walking, some humor, a vast amount of smoking and other things that go to make up a whole man. His was a composite nature, containing good, strong veins both of optimism and pessimism.

He was a free soul, but respected the conventions; he faced to the future, but revered the past; he was constructive, too broad for party or sect, too tall of soul to be fretted by pettiness in others; best of all, he was never ignominious, his sougns ever ringing true to the highest in our nature. Withal he was a kindly soul who would have been marked in any age or clime. He was a combination of the world regards as rare only by cause it does not understand genius.

Tennyson was much of a prophet, as are all poets who are worthy of that high name. In a large way he forecast the triumph of the Hæcæe power over the Greek and even the new woman. Vaguely he forecast the theosophic movement, his poems containing more than a hint of a belief in re-embodiment. He was charged with being an artist, but a mere artist would never have seen so deeply nor so far. Art with him was only an accompaniment. He had the form, but also the substance. He was a master of words, but his words said something. His recitals of speech were highly polished, but were well liked. His lines jingled and sang, but a man cannot read him without doing some robust thinking.

Tennyson's verse is not so jerky as Browning's, not so materialistic and unromantic as Omar's or are they Fitzgerald's and not so didactic as Keats's. He wanted the comic spirit and democratic outlook of Whitman, had little sympathy with republicanism in situations and became somewhat reactionary in his old age. Yet his very lack were an essential part of his character and rang true to his philosophy. We forgive them for that reason. He was not obscure. What he said was uttered with clearness and force, with melody and light. He did not fail to point a moral because he refrained from obtruding it on the view. He was an aristocrat, but his was the aristocracy of noble minds.

What I love most about Tennyson is his Dante-esque spirituality. He saw the other side of things, saw it as no other poet has seen it. I cannot refrain here from quoting Edgar Allan Poe's estimate of him. Some one has remarked it takes a poet to read a poet. Poe was not only a poet, but the keenest critic perhaps that has appeared in America. Of Tennyson he said:

In perfect sincerity I regard him as the noblest poet that ever lived. I call him and think him the noblest of poets not because the impressions he produced are at all times the most profound, not because the poetical excitement which he induces in all times the most intense, but because it is at all times the most ethereal—in other words, the most elevating and the most pure. No poet is so little of the earth earthy.

In this connection let me quote one of Tennyson's poems that seems little known. To us it makes a powerful appeal because it reveals so deep an insight into things little known in the western world. It shows the far advancement of his soul as do few other poems from his pen. It is entitled "The Mystic." I give but a few lines from the beginning and the end:

Angry have talked with him and showed him thrones. Ye know him not; he was not one of ye. Ye scorned him with an undiscerning scorn. Ye could not read the marvel in his eye. The still serene abstraction. He hath felt The beauties of after and before. The Albert, his spirit and his secret heart. The stern experience of convalescence. The linked woos of many a fiery change. Had purified and chainened and made free.

How could ye know him? Ye were ye within The narrow circle. He had well nigh reached The last, which with a region of white flame Pure without heat, into a larger air Upturning and another of black blue Lavretsch and endless all other lives. This element in the English laetrate has puzzled his critics, but for the most part they have evaded it by calling it poetic fancy. How could they know him? They were yet within the narrower circle.

May be not have seen things of which they did not dream? What do we know of life, after the visions of the seers as "poetic fancy"? I have introduced this feature of the great poet because it has been neglected and because to me it seems vital in the proper interpretation of the man. Truly he was "at least" "earth earthy". Here is the real Tennyson, the highest phase of his many-sided genius. Of his "imperialistic" feelings and old age pessimism we can dismiss them as the dream. Here is the pure glow of the man. Here, in his glimpses of unexplored realms, where "God's glory smote him on the face," he called all other poets, and I had well nigh said all other writers. That was to name him overmuch. It is not needed. The simple truth is enough. The spiritual quality of Tennyson's poetry is its chief glory.

BOUGHT SULLIVAN ESTATE

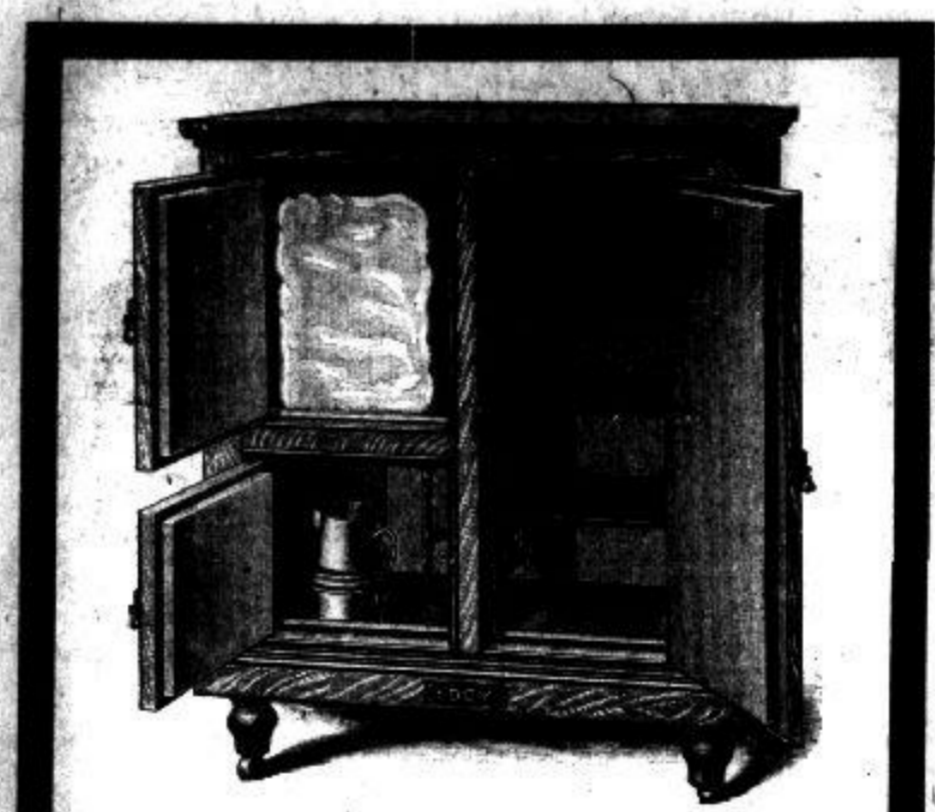
