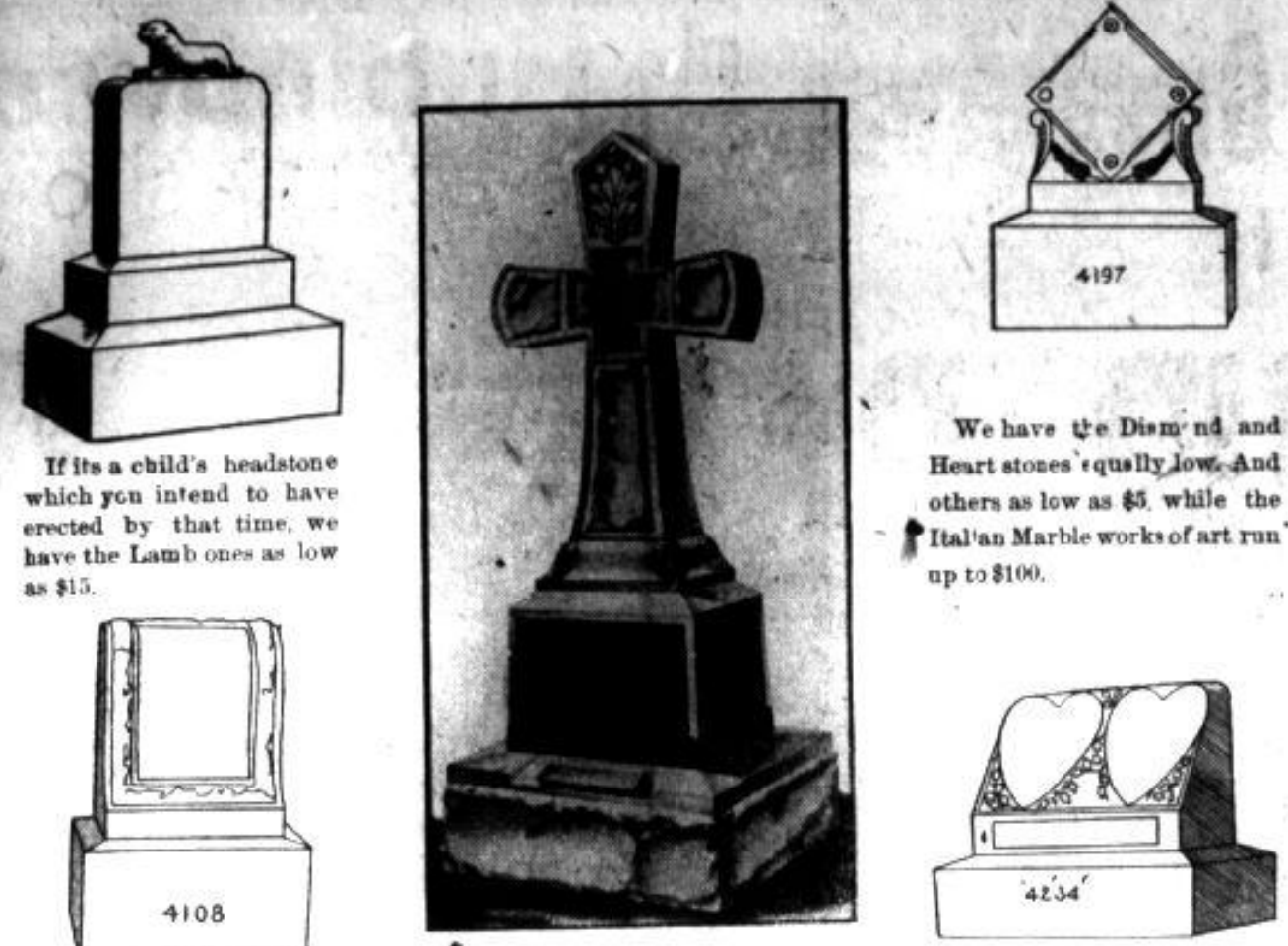

Some interesting and interesting facts Briefly Stated.

Town Clerk Sanford M. Benton informs The News that up to date he has issued 750 dog licenses up to May 1st last year he issued 700. Of the 750 now registered several owners were compelled to pay the extra dollar because they did not give necessary attention to the announcements relative to the "time limit," namely, May 1st, when dogs could be licensed for \$1.15 each.

During the past year Dog Warden Frank C. Slocum disposed of 61 dogs for which he received five dollars each making a total of \$305. The preceding year he cradled but 18 dogs for which he received \$90.

Town Clerk Benton pays over to the state treasurer 75 per cent of all moneys received from the licensing of dogs, provided the remaining 25 per cent is sufficient to pay the loss of the dog warden. Last year it became necessary for the state treasurer to refund a portion of the 75 per cent in order to pay Dog Warden Slocum for his services. There were a goodly number of dogs brought about town, especially at present, for which Dog Warden Slocum should make diligent enquiry. It is not fair to those who do pay license to permit a lot of worthless curs that are not licensed to roam at large.

DIG AUCTION SALE

OF BUILDING LOTS TO TAKE PLACE AT BRUDER PARK IN THIS PLACE NEXT WEEK.

Valuable Property To Be Distributed Free Including Gold Watches for Ladies and Goldens, Valuable Bric a Brac, Silverware, Vases, Etc. See Display in Kandy Kitchen Window.

Edward J. Hill, president of the South Manchester Realty and Development Company will conduct an auction sale of building lots at Bruder Park in this place Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Monday, May 27 to 31 inclusive, starting each day at two o'clock, the closing sale taking place on Decoration Day.

In accordance with his usual custom Mr. Hill will give beautiful presents, specimens of which may be seen in the Kandy Kitchen at the corner of Main street, next to south of the South Manchester post office.

Orford Park is located on West Center street, is 300 feet west of McKee street, three minutes walk from the trolley and the street car line. The tract consists of 35 acres of land and has a frontage of 200 feet on West Center street. Orford Park is composed of what was originally known as the Foley farm and is a large tract. The property is well situated for building lots. It requires no grading whatever, is high and dry and has abundant drainage.

Again, with reference to the building lots to be sold at auction in Orford Park a feature is directed to the fact that the average frontage is from 10 to 74 feet, with an average depth of 100 feet. It is well known that general developers of tracts of land do not give any such sized lots as Mr. Hill is offering at this auction. From 35 to 70 feet is the average width of the lots that last developers usually lay out. This is a point that intending purchasers of building lots should keep in mind and realize that it means a great deal to the home owner.

Mr. Hill has laid out three streets running north and south parallel with McKee street and west thereof, in the following order: Lyness avenue, Orford avenue, Foley avenue. A continuation of Summer street and a street known as Dudley street traverse the tract from east to west. These streets were approved by the town at a meeting Tuesday morning of this week.

On Lyness avenue there are four double lots and three single lots, all of which are occupied at the present time. Lyness avenue is also supplied with running water. Mr. Hill has arranged with the South Manchester Water Company at a cost of \$2,800 which Mr. Hill paid to have the water brought to Orford Park. The main water line is 2,800 feet, for which Mr. Hill paid one dollar per linear foot. These five streets are a total length of one mile, are 40 feet wide each and rows of poplar trees have been planted on all of these streets at a distance of 30 feet apart on both sides of each street.

Chesney Brothers are now negotiating for rights of way for the purpose of extending the sewer system in Orford Park and to the adjacent properties north thereof where houses are already built, and it is expected that within a year sewer facilities will be available in all sections of Orford Park as the sewers are within 100 feet of some at this time.

Orford Park is within easy access of the city milk, with a bulk plant and streets connecting directly with the city. Since Orford Park was laid out one year ago the new ribbon mill of Chesney Brothers have been placed in operation, bringing between three and four hundred operatives to South Manchester. As a result rentals in the west part of the town are very scarce and new houses that have been built in Orford Park and in the adjacent territory are being occupied practically before they are finished.

It should be borne in mind that the development of Orford Park was made under the most adverse circumstances during the financial and commercial stringency of the past year, and the great success which has been made of this enterprise is all the more remarkable.

Every tract of land developed by Mr. Hill up-to-date has proven a success and this has been made so by the character of the people who bought the land and erected buildings thereon, making homes for themselves as well as tenants for rent. Mr. Hill has sold 50 lots on Orford Park and the prices have steadily increased and are now increasing daily by day so that persons who made purchases a year ago can get very good results from their investment if they see fit to sell at the present time.

Edgewood terrace which was developed by Mr. Hill is the west part of the town two years ago, has eight houses and one store is in course of construction there at the present time.

The E. J. Hill tract on the Foster farm occupying Hill street and adjacent territory contains 41 lots all of which have been sold. The houses there and sewer have been brought to that tract and it is being up with homes steadily. When Mr. Hill has sold 50 lots on Orford Park some two years ago the lots were then 100 to 140 feet and were sold for \$1,000 to \$1,200 each. A goodly number of houses have been built on that tract and arrangements are being made for the others to be placed there in the near future.

The tract of land which Mr. Hill bought from C. E. House near the East cemetery contains 24 lots all but eight of which have been sold. The houses there have been built on that tract, one two-story house and two double tenements, and persons are negotiating on the erection of further buildings thereon at this time.

Mr. Hill is not only very active in developing land in South Manchester but he is also engaged in the same business out of town, thus winning the respect of his experience and giving him a ready market for the surplus of his property than he could possibly give by limiting himself to this place.
