



Motorman Quish says that through a slip of memory, owing to the tecenic change in trolley achedules he went by the Biasell switch without walting for the Rockville car to pass there. Near the point where the accident occurred the view is obstructed in both directions by the large barn of Timothy Doyle and neither motorman was able to see the approaching danger until it was too late to avoid the crash. It was marvelous that the motormen were not killed by the impact. The heavy trolley express crashed into the lighter trolley car which had about eleven passengers. Both motormen remained at their posts of duty and did all they could to lighten the crash by applying the hand brakes. 




