DIG AUCTION SALE

OF BUILDING LOTS TO TAKE PLACE AT BRUDER PARK IN THIS PLACE NEXT WEEK.

Valuable Property To Be Distributed Free Including Gold Watches for Ladies and Goldens, Valuable Bicycles, Silverware, Wares, Etc. See Display in Kandy Kitchen Window.

Edward J. Hill, president of the South Manchester Realty and Development Company will conduct an auction sale of building lots at Bruder Park in this place Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Monday, May 27 to 31 inclusive, starting each day at two o'clock, the closing sale taking place on Decoration Day.

In accordance with his usual custom Mr. Hill will give beautiful presents, specimens of which may be seen in the Kandy Kitchen at the Kandy Kitchen, Main street, next to south of the South Manchester post office.

Orford Park is located on West Center street, is 300 feet west of McKee street, three minutes walk from the trolley and the street car. The tract consists of 35 acres of land and has a frontage of 200 feet on West Center street. Orford Park is composed of what was originally known as the Foley farm and is known as such. The tract is well situated for building lots. It requires no grading whatever, is high and dry and has abundant drainage.

Again, with reference to the building lots to be sold at auction in Orford Park a feature is directed to the fact that the average frontage is from 10 to 74 feet, with an average depth of 100 feet. It is well known that general developers of tracts of land do not give such sized lots as Mr. Hill is offering at this auction. From 35 to 70 feet is the average width of the lots that last developers usually lay out. This is a point that intending purchasers of building lots should keep in mind and realize that it means a great deal to the home owner.

Mr. Hill has laid out three streets running north and south parallel with McKee street and west thereof, in the following order: Lyness avenue, Orford avenue, Foley avenue. A continuation of Summer street and a street known as Dudley street traverses the tract from east to west. These streets were approved by the town at a meeting Tuesday morning of this week.

On Lyness avenue there are four double lots and three single lots, all of which are occupied at the present time. Lyness avenue is also occupied with running water. Mr. Hill has arranged with the South Manchester Water Company at a cost of \$2,500 which Mr. Hill paid to have the water brought to Orford Park. The main water line is 2,500 feet, for which Mr. Hill paid one dollar per linear foot. These five streets are a total length of one mile, are 40 feet wide each and none of the lots have been planted on all of these streets at a distance of 30 feet apart on both sides of each street.

Chesney Brothers are now negotiating for rights of way for the purpose of extending the sewer system in Orford Park and to the adjacent properties north thereof where houses are already built, and it is expected that within a year sewer facilities will be available in all sections of Orford Park as the sewers are within 100 feet of some at this time.

Orford Park is within easy access of the city milk, with a bulk plant and streets connecting directly with the milk. Since Orford Park was laid out one year ago the new ribbon mill of Chesney Brothers have been placed in operation, bringing between three and four hundred operators to South Manchester. As a result rentals in the west part of the town are very scarce and new houses that have been built in Orford Park and in the adjacent tract are being occupied practically before they are finished.

It should be borne in mind that the development of Orford Park was made under the most adverse circumstances during the financial and commercial stringency of the past year, and the great success which has been made of this enterprise is all the more remarkable.

Every tract of land developed by Mr. Hill up-to-date has proven a success and this has been made so by the character of the people who bought the land and erected buildings thereon, making homes for themselves as well as tenants for rent. Mr. Hill has sold 50 lots on Orford Park and the prices have steadily increased and are now increasing day by day so that persons who made purchases a year ago can get very good returns on their investment if they see fit to sell at the present time.

Edgewood terrace which was developed by Mr. Hill is the west part of the town two years ago, has eight houses and one store is in course of construction there at the present time.

The E. J. Hill tract on the Foster farm occupying Hill street and adjacent territory contains 41 lots all of which have been sold. The houses there and sewer have been brought to that tract and it is being up with homes steadily. When Mr. Hill has sold 50 lots on Orford Park and the prices have risen to 100 feet and will be 100 to 200 feet, rearranged the tract and now these lots are bringing from \$200 to \$400 each. A goodly number of houses have been built on that tract and arrangements are being made for others to be placed there in the near future.

The tract of land which Mr. Hill bought from C. E. House near the East cemetery contains 24 lots all but eight of which have been sold. The houses have been built on that tract, one two-story house and two double tenements, and persons are negotiating for the erection of further buildings thereon at this time.

Connecticut Legislative Review

Some Comments About House Leadership—Limiting Debates—Probabilities of Prolonged Session—Working Toward Annual Sessions of General Court and Same Is Recommended.

HARTFORD, May 28.—The House of Representatives is ranging the whitewash which falls upon Speaker Burns' voting of the wind when he appointed the House committee in January last. It is more thoroughly impeached than any House in my recollection, which does not extend back as far as that of Joe Mallou's of the Hartford Times or Col. Peck's, but yet covers quite a stretch of legislative history. There have been times when there has existed fully an independent House; indeed, I don't call this an independent House, for it has few and small principles and little independence in expressing what it does have; but it is doubtful if there has ever existed a House with so little organization and such a lack of a machine or machinery.

Chairman Burns of the Judiciary Committee is nominally the leader of the House, but what that leadership has amounted to recently is shown in the fact that every time there is a chance to oppose him, and it takes little difference in the House seems to take a delight in doing this. Not that anybody is trying to take his leadership away from him; there are some who would like and don't quite know how; but that the House simply follows the lead of the moment without much idea of where it is going to bring up. Chandler was able to seize a situation when he spent the plan to dispose of the public utilities matter, yet it is doubtful if he would be able to do this again tomorrow morning.

The House hardly knows what it really wants on anything. Take the case of today's turning down of the five-minute rule, which was not a rule at all and merely a resolution limiting the debate to five minutes for each speaker and would not require two-thirds' vote of the House to do away with, by any means, after Burns has clearly shown the reason for it. It is always the custom about this time in the session to present such a rule as the simple request of the speaker as always sufficient to get it passed. It isn't especially binding except the moral effect. But the House turned it down today, and it is very doubtful if there is a single man who would admit it who could give a clear reason why he did.

There isn't much that's new on the public utilities matter this week as yet. The special committee has assigned hearings tomorrow next week Tuesday and Wednesday, and hopes to conclude the hearings with that. This plan gives Thursday for committee reports, and would make it possible to set a report ready by June 8. It all depends on whether Burns develops any determination for a committee on tomorrow's hearing. If this does happen, the matter will take longer and the committee will have to seek a continuance. If not there will be little of moment at the hearing and the committee can simply go over such material as it has in hand and frame some sort of a bill to report on the 12th.

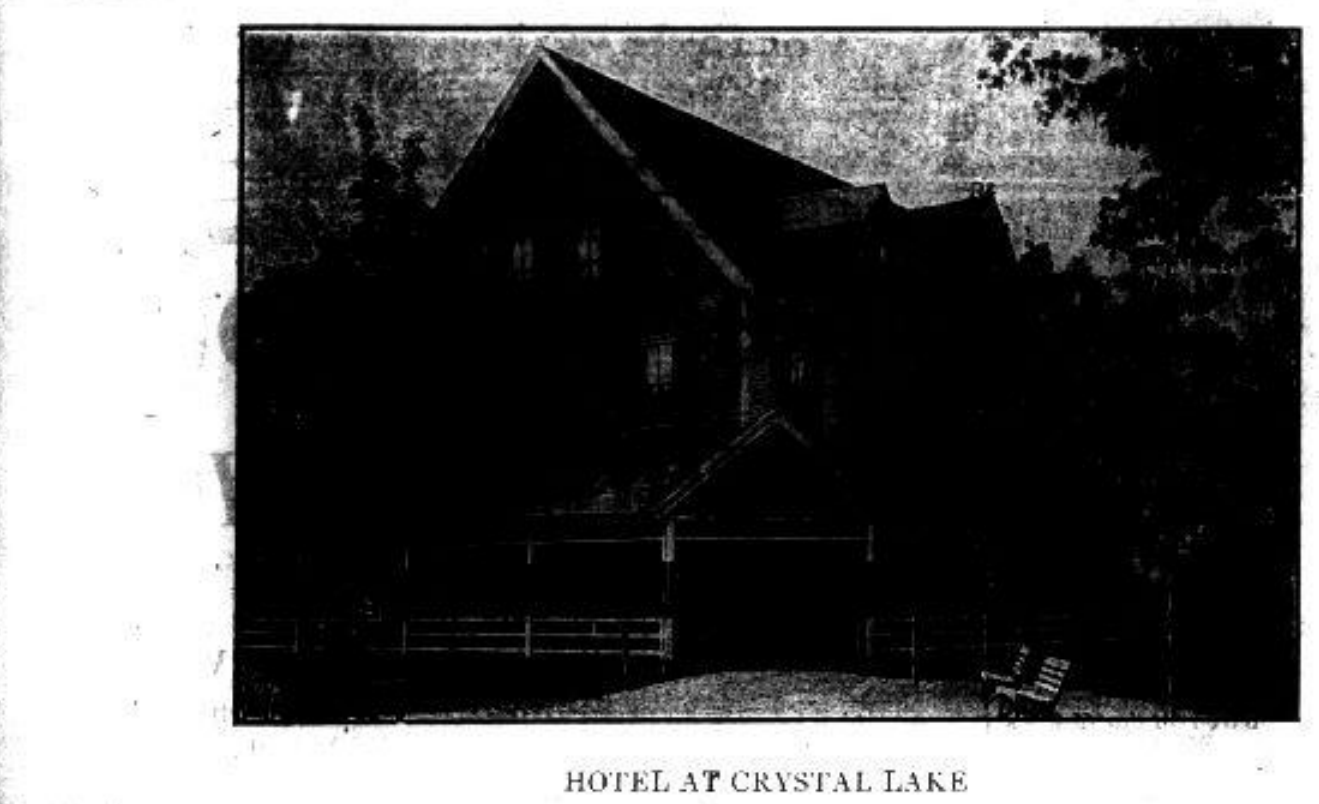
